

Overall Sentiment







Sacramentans, like Americans everywhere, have been steadily losing trust in the government. This suggests that this low level of confidence in government institutions isn't a one-off trend—it's here to stay. The Measure O head fake certainly will further exacerbate Sacramento's very own doom loop.

The city spent 2 years discussing and wasting millions of dollars on the failed Comp Homeless Siting Plan. It created a new city department funded with \$10M—Community Response —whose job now is to tell homeless folks to move along because no shelter or services are available. And the private company Forensiclean (which has city employees on payroll) gets multimillion dollar contracts to implement the city's real homeless policy—whacka-mole (AKA Sweeps).

Measure O was a nod and a wink deal that city never intended to keep. Measure O prohibits the City from allowing homeless sites on the river and in our parks. Miller Park- in the fragile and troubled West Broadway neighborhood area - is both.

Beginning in February 2022, the City placed BOTH a homeless "Safe Parking" site AND a 60 tent homeless camping site at Miller Park! At that time very concerned neighbors were told that the use of the park for City homeless sites was "only temporary". Here we all are 16 months later with the City still using Miller Park as a homeless site! Then in March of this year (2023) City officials told Channel 10 and concerned neighbors that

Miller Park would only be used for 15-17 homeless trailers for a "maximum of 60 days". It's now been about 90 days and all those City homeless trailers are still at Miller Park. Trust in the word of government is very low. Please improve and earn that public trust!

And, this use of Miller Park is in the already troubled and fragile West Broadway area that Darrell Steinberg promised concerned neighbors back in 2015 that if we voted for him for Mayor, that he would work hard to significantly reduce and redistribute the severe and very harmful concentration of Sacramento's public housing that has been unfairly placed in the West Broadway neighborhood for over 70 years (two largest, oldest, dilapidated, and problematic public housing projects ANYWHERE in the 13- County Sacramento Region, plus another 75 unit low-income apartment complex right next to the Sevey Circle public housing projects – that btw that when it was built the City promised neighbors would always be market rate and seniors only). Talk about a very harmful and unfair concentration of such low income housing in one little Sacramento area! Trust in Mayor Steinberg is very low in the West Broadway neighborhood.

Once elected, Darrell did not honor his campaign pledge, and then worked with CM Valenzuela to ADD two City homeless sites at Miller Park. That can be called "adding insult to injury". Very concerned neighbors also repeatedly explained to these two politicians and other City officials that neighbors had worked very long and hard to have the previous City sanctioned homeless center at Miler Park (VOA) moved because placing a homeless site at a public park created so many risks and problems for the public park users. Plus neighbors advised that the City should never place such homeless sites on the INSIDE of the Sacramento River levy because of flooding risks. City officials told neighbors that flooding was no longer a risk because of the drought .City officials went ahead and placed City homeless sites INDSIDE the river levy! What could possibly go wrong?! As we all know some of the Miller Park area did flood this year. All the fragile homeless there has to be moved quickly to higher and safe ground far away from Miler Park. What trauma to those homeless folks, and at great costs to taxpayers. What a MAJOR bungle by City officials.

When the City went ahead anyway and opened the City homeless sites at Miller park, the park and river area there become inundated with a lot more homeless that did not get allowed into the actual City sites. There have been many very expensive (to the taxpayers) problems resulting. Shortly after the City placed the homeless "Safe Parking" site at Miller Park, a huge illegal homeless camping site began forming in the gulley directly below the Safe Parking site, and I-5 that is directly east of Miller Park. It became known as the homeless "Gulley Camp". That illegal site caused major environmental damage to the wooded park area by the river. Hazmat crews were sent in repeatedly to clean up the human and dog feces, and hundreds of illegal drug use needles. Trees were chopped down and burned. Major garbage and other litter clean ups at taxpayers' expense resulted. Stuff (including a 60 horse outboard Mercury boat engine) was stolen from the very nearby Marina (that was created at MAJOR taxpayer expense). Many Marina boat owners vacated their City slips there, costly the City (taxpayers) much needed revenue. Many boat owners are still across the river on the Yolo County side, providing revenue to that county. What a major City screw up!

This homeless "Gulley Camp" was only about 15 yards from where the City placed an official homeless safe parking site that then attracted far more homeless to come to camp at or very near Miller Park. Then the City moved the Safe Parking site closer to the river, further inside Miller Park. The hazmat crew that recently vacated the huge 60+ homeless tents/campers (after about a year of the camping there without toilets) at the "Gulley Camp" there told me that area was a major hazardous waste problem with hundreds of illegal drug syringes and MUCH human feces. Remember, the City moved the portable toilets when they moved that "safe parking site further into Miller park, near the other City's another 60 tent homeless site at Miler Park. And those 60 + homeless campers were there almost a year until the City Manager's Office and others including Parks, Caltrans, and Railroads recently vacated that area (Neighbors THANK those that did that!).

This week I again saw a City hazmat crew in that specific area. As I mentioned in a June 14, 2023 3:22 PM email to you City officials, there is one homeless tent camp with a lot of garbage and BIG menacing dog just outside the area you fenced off after cleaning up the previous huge "Gulley Camp at Miller Park. The homeless camper has now posted a sign on the tree there saying "Beware of Dog". The dog was on a lease today, but if it was not, or broke free, and chased and attacked a member of the public, the City may have a lawsuit on its' hands. Please be advised.

Again, that Gulley Camp was, and this new homeless camper with the big vicious dog is, right next to the west

side of the "Setzer's Run" pathway under the I-5 Freeway that City officials have told West Broadway neighbors for about a decade that the City would "soon" be used as a wonderful public walk/jog/bicycle path to Miller Park and the river paths there. What a great, safe, and healthy public asset that COULD be! And it COULD allow families with young children (and grandchildren) to safely access Miller Park and those river paths. We all know that walking or biking along traffic-congested Broadway is far too dangerous to get there, especially with young children/grandchildren. West Broadway neighbors include all those in the public housing projects right there, and all the new young folks in the Mill development that is directly on the east side of this "Setzer Run" tunnel under I-5. The Mill management also supports opening up that tunnel but insists that the City clean up the homeless sites and problems first at Miller Park because opening the tunnel path before that would create too many major safety risks and problems for the residents there.

You officials are aware of the very serious dangers to the public using Miller Park that are being allowed/ created by the City officials with their actions or lack of actions. You are aware of all the huge costs to taxpayers that have resulted. Again, Measure O prohibits the use of Miller Park as a homeless site. Please provide needed leadership and stop using Miller Park and the West Broadway neighborhood area as a dumping ground for lots of programs that you would not allow in your own districts, or near/in public parks in your own neighborhoods. It's no coincidence that such use of a public park for homeless camping, and major concentration of pubic and other low income housing is in the troubled and fragile West Broadway neighborhood that contains such a high percentage of persons of color, and that are poor and politically weak. There is a long and troubling history, including major racism) of that area being abused, while predominantly White and affluent areas of Sacramento contain NO such homeless sites, or ANY public or ANY other low income housing. 

The dog was on a lease today, but if it was not, or broke free, and chased and attacked a member of the public, the <u>City may have a lawsuit on its' hands.</u> Please be advised.

Again, that Gulley Camp was, and this new homeless camper with the big vicious dog is,

right next to the west side of the "Setzer's Run" pathway under the I-5 Freeway that City officials have told West Broadway neighbors for about a decade that the City would "soon" be used as a wonderful public walk/jog/bicycle path to Miller Park and the river paths there. What a great, safe, and healthy public asset that COULD be! And it COULD allow families with young children (and grandchildren) to safely access Miller Park and those river paths. We all know that walking or biking along traffic-congested Broadway is far too dangerous to get there, especially with young children/grandchildren. West Broadway neighbors include all those in the public housing projects right there, and all the new young folks in the Mill development that is directly on the east side of this "Setzer Run" tunnel under I-5. The Mill management also supports opening up that tunnel but insists that the City clean up the homeless sites and problems first at Miller Park because opening the tunnel path before that would create too many major safety risks and problems for the residents there.

You officials are aware of the very serious dangers to the public using Miller Park that are being allowed/ created by the City officials with their actions or lack of actions. You are aware of all the huge costs to taxpayers that have resulted. Again, Measure O prohibits the use of Miller Park as a homeless site. Please provide needed leadership and stop using Miller Park and the West Broadway neighborhood area as a dumping ground for lots of programs that you would not allow in your own districts, or near/in public parks in your own neighborhoods. It's no coincidence that such use of a public park for homeless camping, and major concentration of pubic and other low income housing is in the troubled and fragile West Broadway neighborhood that contains such a high percentage of persons of color, and that are poor and politically weak. There is a long and troubling history, including major racism) of that area being abused, while predominantly White and affluent areas of Sacramento contain NO such homeless sites, or ANY public or ANY other low income housing. Do self-serving politicians accept this racist and horrible inequity because they fear losing elections and their coveted positions if the try to implement fair share placement practices? For instance, you politicians would never try to place such homeless sites at McKinley Park, Land Park, or Garcia Bend Park (near the Mayor's own neighborhood- where he plays tennis sometimes). You know such attempted placement would be political suicide, and drain your campaign funding.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS About Homelessness in the City of Sacramento

Sacramento City's official website has a list of FAQs with answers (labeled A# below) about the various ways unsheltered people can be criminalized when sheltered people are bothered by unsheltered people's existence near their businesses and neighborhoods. Given the very unfriendly tone of the city's suggestions, it's not at all surprising that neighborhoods have rejected the council's city-wide Master Plan for 'temporary' camping and tiny-house sites. http://homeless.cityofsacramento.org/faqs

Sheltered people are often unaware of how easy it is to be labeled as a criminal and how much harder it then becomes to obtain secure and permanent shelter, let alone healing from PTSD, paying off the predatory fines and fees inflicted by various judges, and getting an education and a living-wage job. In other words, homelessness is a problem we will never be able to sweep and arrest our way out of. Sweeping our problems under the rug is not a solution.

In that spirit, here are a few attempts to suggest more constructive alternative tactics. I welcome additional suggestions.

Alternative Answers (AA#)

Q1: Who can I call with an inquiry or complaint regarding encampments established by persons experiencing homelessness?

AA1:

a. Have you discussed the situation with the homeless people?

Be aware that homeless people will almost certainly feel fearful that your approach bodes problems such as police citations and fines that will just make their lives even less manageable. Many of the 'solutions' (sic) used to sweep homelessness under the rug, like exiling homeless folks from residential and commercial areas, often cause PTSD and fix nothing. Unsurprisingly, the unsheltered tend to retreat to areas where few sheltered people spend much time. Reassure yourself that while a small fraction of the homeless population suffers from a basic psychosis such as schizophrenia, such unfortunates are much more often the victims of violence than the perpetrators. The fact that none of the city's suggestions refer to violent attacks from homeless people implies they are not at all common.

A more significant fraction is people who lost their job, their car or their apartment, or they got sick and didn't have good or any insurance, or they got divorced, or their student loan servicer garnished their wages, or they still had PTSD from war or other prior abuse, or they were a victim of ID theft, fire, flood, or a car crash, etc. You have the power to help bring homeless people back into the Sacramento economy and community by developing relationships with specific individuals based on the common ground of individual and egalitarian human conversation.

Reassure yourself that many homeless people are quite intelligent and capable, possessing

various skills that supported them before misfortune sank their financial boat. Treating homeless people the way you would like to be treated is a good way to evaluate their abilities and aptitudes. Most people like doing things that are truly useful, yet city and county government seem insistent on not empowering capable homeless people to assist in the management and care of the increasing population of homeless people in Sacramento.

- b. Have you discussed the situation with your neighbors? Your neighbors may benefit from understanding the information under #1 above.
- c. If the homeless people are really bothering you, please write down the observable or measurable problems you are experiencing. Since sane people who are homeless will do whatever is necessary to survive, evaluate your survival necessities and your hypothetical choices if you could not obtain safe and secure shelter and had no ready access to potable water, healthy food, or sanitation. How would you like sheltered people to treat you, if you were broke and on the street?

If you have witnessed drug use, be aware that there is no evidence that addicted homeless people are more violent or dangerous than addicted sheltered people.

- d. Invite your neighbors to identify the observable problems in writing. Again, share with them the suggestions above. After a complete assessment of the situation, consider the best possible recipients of this information and suggestions for effective action. Like affordable housing. While this takes more time and energy than just calling 911, it also frees city staff for other priorities.

Q2: I submitted an inquiry or complaint regarding an encampment established by persons experiencing homelessness to 311. Why hasn't a Sacramento police officer arrested the occupants? Why hasn't the encampment been removed or relocated?

AA2: Being homeless is not a crime. There are many common reasons people become homeless against their will. As you know, housing is quite expensive in California, and illegal evictions are

not rare. Obviously, an illegal eviction is a crime, though it's rarely prosecuted. The city of Sacramento's Tenant Protection Program offers some assistance: http://www.cityofsacramento.org/Community-Development/Code-Compliance/Tenant-Protection-Program

One big reason an encampment hasn't been relocated is that no better location is available. The city's Master Plan for well-managed encampments and other temporary housing has yet to be implemented. Although the plan distributes these sites throughout the city, among all council districts, opposition from residents and businesses and funding challenges have slowed progress.

A proper location for an encampment would be where there are water and sewer connections, as well as cooking facilities. Protection such as trees or overhead canopies would buffer weather extremes. As you know, the climate is changing and climate refugees will likely be arriving sooner than you expect.

Another reason to delay a sweep of an encampment is that it causes a lot of misery and uses a lot of unnecessary time and energy on the part of homeless people who could potentially do something more constructive with that time and energy in addition to finding water, food, and shelter every day. It also uses government staff time which could be used in far more constructive ways, and which is paid for by your taxes.

There is one policy which if approved by local government would reduce the homeless population to proportions not seen since before Reagan was elected. Charging a fee for bedrooms not being slept in would be very effective. Unfortunately, most really effective policies require too much political will.

Q3: Can persons experiencing homelessness start a fire to cook food or stay warm?

AA3: Obviously, anyone **can** start a fire. And obviously they are not supposed to. However, the survival instinct is very strong. It is foolish to expect people to just give in and die of hunger or cold.

Q4: I see a person experiencing homelessness using drugs or drinking in public. What can be done?

AA4: Ask that person if they need help. Consider calling 211 for assistance from health professionals. Alternatively, pretend there is a wall around him or her. If you can't hear them over the wall, you can stop worrying about your safety.

Q5: I see used syringes on a public street or sidewalk. Can the City pick them up?

A5: Yes. The City can dispatch a contractor to remove used syringes from public property. Reports of used syringes on public property should be directed to **311**.

AA5: The city does have some good advice here. Hopefully such a report leads to immediate action.

Q6: A person experiencing homelessness is camping on my private property. Can I have that person removed?

A6: Yes. In general terms, a person entering or remaining upon your private property is trespassing in violation of state and local law. Reports of someone trespassing on your property and refusing to leave should be directed to the Sacramento Police Department at **916-808-5471**.

However, reports of someone trespassing on the private property of another should be directed to **311**.

AA6: Please review the suggestions under AA1 above. Respect for the property rights of another suggests consulting that property owner as to whether the homeless person has the property owner's permission to be there.

Q7: A person experiencing homelessness was trespassing on my private property and left trash behind. Who is responsible for removing the trash?

A7: Owners of private property are responsible for maintaining their property free of junk and debris. Property owners must arrange for trash removal and secure their properties from trespassers.

AA7: If you don't feel like hiring a hazardous waste professional to remove abandoned items, just review the situation logically, and carefully inspect and analyze the appearance of said items. If you are a homeowner, you probably have various tools on hand, such as shovels and gloves, that will allow safe disposal into your garbage can.

If you see used syringes, here is some information designed to ensure safe handling and disposal thereof. Bear in mind that having a safe injection site locally should eliminate the hazard of finding them unsecured.
