Healthy Places Index: History & Purpose



HISTORY OF HPI

Originally launched in 2018 by the Public Health Alliance of Southern California (Alliance), the Healthy Places Index (HPI) is a powerful and easy-to-use data and policy platform created to advance health equity through open and accessible data.

The main goal of the HPI is to advance health equity through open data. We provide community leaders, policymakers, academics and other stakeholders with the tools they need to identify inequity, prioritize equitable investment and strengthen community voices with sound validated data.

Now in its third release, the HPI has become a go-to data tool for hundreds of state and local government agencies, foundations, advocacy groups, hospitals and other organizations that want to apply a health equity lens to their work.

HPI Local Neighborhood Health Information

- Low levels of employment and income
- Low levels of medical insurance
- High levels of owner and renter severe housing cost burden

Existing Alcohol Outlet Sales Within 300 feet:


- Arco AM/PM selling beer at 6698 Mack Road

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California's high COVID rates connected to poor air quality

This week, researchers from UCSF and the Public Health Institute <u>published a study</u> that found that Californians exposed to PM 2.5, a fine particulate matter that spews from tailpipes and industrial sources common in cities, had a much greater risk of infection and death from COVID-19. The results are grim: Residents exposed to long-term elevated levels of air pollution were 20% more likely to contract COVID-19 and over 50% more likely to die because of it. The study estimates that if air quality impacts were improved, over 4,000 deaths could have been prevented within the timeframe studied, which was between February 2020 and February 2021.

Sacramento's 100+ degree days could triple in next 30 years, new climate tool shows

If the effects of climate change continue unchecked, Sacramento could exceed 90 degrees for about one-third of the calendar year beginning in 2035, and reach triple digits nearly 50 days a year by the middle of the century.

That's according to <u>a new online tool created</u> released Monday by Public Health Institute's Public Health Alliance of Southern California in partnership with the UCLA Luskin Center for Innovation.

The tool — available at heat.healthyplacesindex.org — displays expected increases in extreme heat impacts across California cities, counties, ZIP codes and other geographic boundaries such as congressional districts.

"We are glad to have more data to work with when developing policy recommendations around extreme heat conditions and how it effects the city of Sacramento, especially those residents most vulnerable to the impacts of extreme heat," Matt Hertel, the city's long-range planning manager, said in an emailed response.






Using CalEEMod to understand existing health & equity burdens





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
