SUBJECT: GRANT PROPOSAL - GANG VIOLENCE SUPPRESSION PROGRAM

SUMMARY

This report requests approval to apply for fifth year funding from the Office of Criminal Justice Planning (OCJP) to continue the Gang Violence Suppression Program. The Gang Violence Suppression Program includes one Police Officer, one Community Service Officer, and one Police Clerk I/II. Funding for the fifth year of the grant program is \$115,000 of which OCJP will provide a 75%, or \$86,250, cash match. The City of Sacramento is required to provide a 25%, or \$28,750, cash match. The 25% cash match required by the City of Sacramento has been funded in the 90/91 approved budget. The grant program will be in operation through June 30, 1991. There is no anticipated funding after June 30, 1991.

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

**RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE EXECUTION OF A CONTRACT
WITH THE OFFICE OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE PLANNING
TO IMPLEMENT FIFTH YEAR FUNDING OF THE
GANG VIOLENCE SUPPRESSION PROGRAM**

WHEREAS the Sacramento Police Department desires to undertake a certain project designated Gang Suppression Unit (GSU) to be funded in part from funds made available through Chapter 1093, 1982 Statutes, the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 1974, as amended, Public Law 98-473, and/or Justice Assistance Act of 1984 (JAA) for the Gang Violence Suppression Program administered by the Office of Criminal Justice Planning (hereafter referred to a OCJP).

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Manager of the City of Sacramento, or his designated representative, is authorized on its behalf to submit the proposal to OCJP and is authorized to execute on behalf of the City Council the Grant Award Agreement including any extensions or amendments thereof.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City of Sacramento agrees to provide all matching funds required for said project (including any amendment thereof) under the Program and the policies and procedure of OCJP and that funds will be appropriated as required.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Office of Investigations, Gang/Enforcement Section (2141) will continue to be increased by 2.3 FTE positions, as follows:

- 1.0 FTE Police Officer
- 1.0 FTE Community Service Officer
- 1.0 FTE Police Clerk II
- .7 FTE Student Trainee

SUBJECT: GRANT PROPOSAL - GANG VIOLENCE SUPPRESSION PROGRAM

SUMMARY

This report requests approval to apply for fifth year funding from the Office of Criminal Justice Planning (OCJP) to continue the Gang Violence Suppression Program. The Gang Violence Suppression Program includes one Police Officer, one Community Service Officer, and one Police Clerk I/II. Funding for the fifth year of the grant program is \$115,000 of which OCJP will provide a 75%, or \$86,250, cash match. The City of Sacramento is required to provide a 25%, or \$28,750, cash match. The 25% cash match required by the City of Sacramento has been funded in the 90/91 approved budget. The grant program will be in operation through June 30, 1991. There is no anticipated funding after June 30, 1991.

BACKGROUND

In July, 1986, the Sacramento Police Department received grant funds in the amount of \$115,000 from the Office of Criminal Justice Planning (OCJP) to implement a Gang Violence Suppression Program for the period July 1, 1986 to June 30, 1987. The grant was funded 100% by OCJP and a city match was not required. Two Police Officers were funded by the grant to investigate the rising incidence of gang-related crime and violence within the City of Sacramento. These two Police Officer positions have been funded by the General Fund since the 87/88 fiscal year.

The Police Department received second year funding in the amount of \$110,000 from OCJP for the period July 1, 1987 to June 30, 1988, again funded 100% by OCJP with no cash match required. Second year funding expanded the Gang Violence Suppression Program to include a gang prevention component. One Police Officer, one Gang Prevention Specialist and the upgrade of a Student Trainee position to a Police Clerk I/II were added to provide preventive measures to discourage "at-risk" youths from becoming involved in gang activities.

The Police Department received third year funding in the amount of \$115,000 for the period July 1, 1988 to June 30, 1989. OCJP provided 80% funding, or \$92,000, with a 20%, or \$23,000, cash match required from the City of Sacramento. Third year funding continued the gang prevention component established in the second year of the grant. One Police Officer, one Community Service Officer which replaced the Gang Prevention Specialist, and one Police Clerk I/II continued to provide preventive measures to discourage "at-risk" youths from becoming involved in gang activities.

Fourth year funding was received as an augmentation of \$65,083 to the third year of the grant and allowed the grant to continue operation through June 30, 1990. OCJP again provided 80%, or \$52,066, of the augmentation funding. The remaining 20%, or \$13,017, was provided as a cash match by the City of Sacramento.

The Police Department is now requesting approval to apply for fifth year funding in the amount of \$115,000 for the period July 1, 1990, to June 30, 1991. OCJP will provide 75% funding, or \$86,250, with a 25%, or \$28,750, cash match required from the City of Sacramento. The cash match portion was included in the 90/91 approved budget. The fifth year of this grant will continue to fund one Police Officer, one Community Service Officer, and one Police Clerk II. It is anticipated that funding beyond the fifth year will not be provided by OCJP.

FINANCIAL DATA

The total operating budget for the fifth year of the grant program is \$115,000 funded 75% by the Office of Criminal Justice Planning. A City cash match of 25% or \$28,750 is required and has been approved in the 90/91 budget. The operating budget for the 90/91 fiscal year is itemized as follows:

In June of 1988, SPD formed a Task Force of 46 sworn and 6 non-sworn positions to deal with the narcotic and gang related problem. The primary objectives were to identify new gang members, collect and disseminate information on gang and narcotic activities to the entire SPD and to actively enforce statutes and arrest persons involved in gangs and/or narcotic violations. 6. OBJECTIVE

(CONTINUED)

During the fiscal year of 88/89, the TAsk Force made 3,310 arrests. In contrast, in 1987 there were 89 homicides in the City of Sacramento, 46.2% of which were drug or gang related. In 1988, there were 72 homicides, of which only 27.9% were drug or gang related. Although there was a significant decline in both the number of homicides and the percentage of drug and/or gang involvement, it is still too high.

There are currently 52 active gangs in the City of Sacramento, an increase of 8 gangs during the fiscal year 89/90. The number of identified gang members during this period has risen from approximately 2,200 to over 3,000. It is estimated that there are still hundreds of unidentified and active gang members, associates and "wanna-bees". These individuals are continually involved in crimes of violence, including murders, assaults, drive-by shootings, extortion and narcotic sales/distribution. In fiscal year 89/90, the Gang Unit alone will arrest approximately 250 gang members for crimes of violence or narcotic violations. In addition, the unit will provide needed assistance and/or information resulting in numerous additional arrests by SPD Officers.

The target area is the incorporated area of the City of Sacramento. The gang problem in Sacramento is not limited to a specific area or community in our City. We currently have 52 active gangs in the City, which are spread throughout numerous areas of the City.

During fiscal year 89/90, we have experienced increased visibility and gang activity, principally in regards to Southeast Asians. This has caused us to focus more attention on yet other areas of the City. Many of the gangs do not recognize city, county or even state boundaries. As such, our investigations have frequently taken us into the county and even into other states.

Over the past several years, we have developed and continue to enjoy excellent working relationships with the following agencies:

1. Sacramento County Sheriff's
2. Sacramento County Probation
3. Sacramento County District Attorney
4. California Youth Authority
5. California Department of Parole
6. Numerous other state and out-of-state law enforcement agencies.

In fiscal year 89/90, the number of active street gangs in the City of Sacramento grew from 44 to 52. The total number of identified gang members/associates was approximately 2,200 at the start of this fiscal year. By July 1, 1990, we estimate that we will have approximately 3,300 identified gang members/associates. In addition to this number, there are untold numbers of subjects we have yet to identify.

The Gang Unit made approximately 250 arrests of gang members during this fiscal year. Of these, approximately 90% were felonies. In addition to these arrests, the Gang Unit provided assistance, expertise or intelligence information, which resulted in an untold number of arrests.

In the 1989, the SPD investigated 54 homicides, of which 24% were gang related. To date, in 1990, the SPD has investigated 23 homicides, of which 8% were gang related.

During the past year, we experienced a drastic increase in the amount of Southeast Asian gang related crimes. These crimes generally included home robberies, extortion, gambling and auto theft. Southeast Asian crimes are often extremely violent. These crimes are extremely difficult to investigate and necessitate special handling and expertise. During the past year, the Gang Unit has received necessary and needed training in Southeast Asian crimes. We, as a unit, have become very active in these gang related crimes.

The bulk of the street gangs are still Hispanic and Black gangs. They continue to be active in their traditional crimes of violence.

The Gang Unit consists of a Project Director, working supervisor, five (5) detectives, a Community Service Officer and a Police Clerk II. The CSO maintains and updates our files and publishes the weekly bulletins from information provided to him by the Gang Unit. The sergeant and detectives are responsible for the investigation of gang related crimes and gathering of criminal intelligence on gang members.

If available, include a copy of the selection criteria used to identify gang members used by the GVS unit. Describe the involvement of other agencies in establishing the criteria.

This criteria is used to profile gang members and is universal with other law enforcement agencies throughout the State. The definition of a gang and the criteria used for profiling a gang member originated at the California State Attorney General's Office.

A "Street Gang" is defined as a group of three (3) or more individuals that identify themselves by a name or are recognized by others as a group who may claim territory and/or "turf, hood", etc.. and are involved in criminal activity.

In order to able use the term "gang member", at least two (2) of the following criterias must be met:

1. The individual admits his membership
2. The individual is tattooed with gang logo or wears gang colors
3. The individual repeatedly is in the company of identified gang members
4. The individual is involved in gang related crimes
5. The individual is named by two (2) or more identified gang members as being a member
6. County Jail, CYA, or prison correspondence where the individual identifies himself as a gang member
7. The individual has brothers (or other family) or are going affiliated, (this term requires two (2) additional areas of substantiation)

This will be done by following up on reported crimes as well as doing probation/parole searches and making routine, but targeted contacts in the field. We will refer all of our gang cases to the DA's office "Gang Unit". We will request those gang members identified as "high profile" or "highly active" be prosecuted by a "Gang Unit DA" whenever possible, but taking into account the case load of the specialist DA's. We will continue our excellent working relationship with the DA's office and receive solicited and unsolicited feed back from them on the cases prosecuted and adjudicated.

The Crime Analysis Unit receives all field contact cards generated by SPD Officers. This information is then entered into the SPD computer system. The FC cards noting possible gang connections are then routed to the Gang Unit Sgt. The Sgt. then directs the CSO to update the units gang files as well. In addition, the Gang Sgt. reviews a summary of all reports generated by SPD on a daily basis. Cases that are gang related are requested for follow-up by the Gang Unit or information/assistance is offered to the assigned Detective when appropriate.

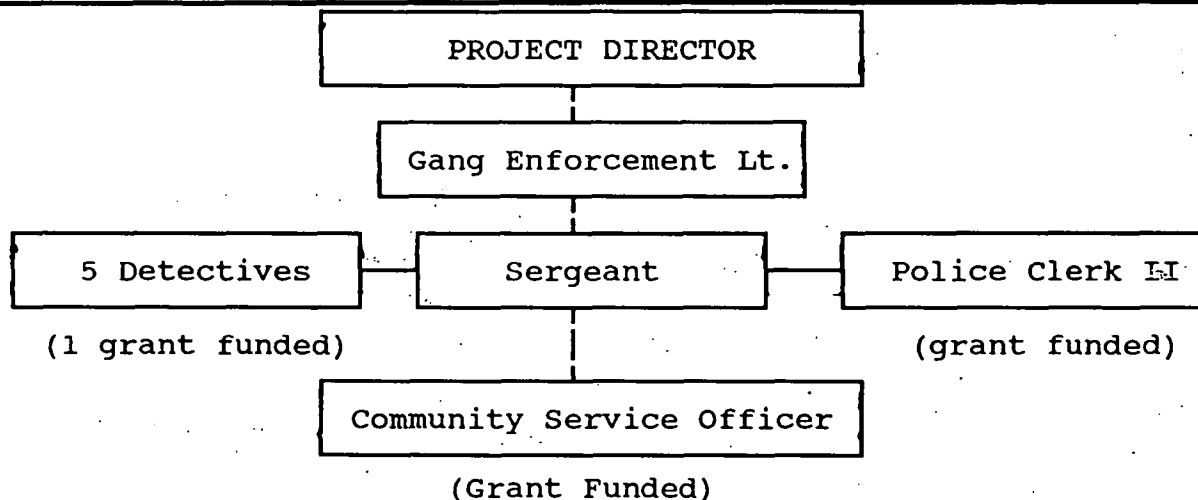
Activities

The Captain in charge of the Narcotics/Gangs Division Unit will serve as Project Director and will be responsible for all administrative tasks associated with grant funding. He will have direct supervisory responsibility of the Gang Enforcement Lt. In terms of the philosophical thrust of the GSU. The Lt. will supervise the GSU Sergeant.

The Sergeant of the unit will serve as intake officer and will be in charge of the direction and field supervision of five (5) gang investigators who make up the nucleus of the Gang Unit. He will determine, direct, and implement a daily plan of action for the GSU. He will then evaluate daily performance using submitted reports and a daily journal kept by the GSU. The Sergeant will compile such reports as required by the Project Director, who will evaluate the performance of the unit on the established criteria of arrest, conviction, prison commitment statistics, and the effectiveness of the gang prevention programs established with the target area.

The clerical support will accomplish the majority of systems updates regarding membership currently kept by the unit investigators and supervisor. The clerical support position will answer to the supervising sergeant.

The CSO will:

1. Gather information from arrest, crime, incident, and field contact reports and from other various criminal investigations.
2. Disseminate the above information through weekly "Gang Intelligence Bulletins" to our department personnel, Sacramento Sheriff's Department Task Force, Probation Department's Gang Unit and the California Youth Authority.

The Sacramento County District Attorney's Office has consistently worked closely with the Gang Suppression Unit in the vigorous prosecution of hardcore gang members. We will continue to work closely with this agency, in order to obtain the maximum sentences possible for gang members who break the law and pose a serious threat to the citizens of Sacramento, (see attached letters of support).

GANG SUPPRESSION UNIT:

The Sacramento Gang Suppression Unit will attend a monthly meeting hosted by the District Attorney's Office for the purpose of discussing current gang problems and cases. These meetings are attended by numerous area law enforcement agencies.

Although the Sacramento Police Department's Gang Suppression Unit works most closely with the above two (2) agencies, we will continue to work (when possible) with local schools and community organizations in the assessment of growing and pending gang conflicts.
