

Background

In July 2000, the Sacramento Police Department undertook a comprehensive study of traffic stops to address perceptions of racial profiling. In March 2004, City Council approved the establishment of a formal advisory commission to provide representation, accountability, and reporting from Sacramento residents on this issue of national importance. In November 2004, City Council confirmed selections for membership on the Community Racial Profiling Commission, whose purpose it is to assist the City with its racial profiling vehicle stop study.

Subject: Community Racial Profiling Commission Quarterly Report
(April – June 2006)

The Community Racial Profiling Commission (CRPC), established in November 2004, continued to fulfill its mission to serve as an advisory body of our community regarding bias free policing. This second quarterly report of 2006 describes the activities of the CRPC from April through June 2006.

Commission Membership

The following table depicts the second quarter status of Commission membership. Due to the resignation of the member from District 2, the Commission experienced two vacancies and recruitment was initiated by the City Clerk. Jerry Enomoto continued to serve as the interim representative of the Office of Public Safety Accountability for Commission meetings held in April and May of 2006. Former OPSA Director Don Casimere returned to the post on May 22, 2006.

The new CRPC website – <http://www.cityofsacramento.org/crpc/index.htm> – debuted at the end of April, providing readily available, valuable information including the history, vision, mission, and values of the Commission; the history of data collection in Sacramento; membership information and openings; agendas, synopses, and reports; and other Commission-related updates.

Traffic Stop Data Study

Lamberth Consulting continued to learn about Police Department processes of data collection and mapping, in-car camera recording, pedestrian and bicycle stops, and Police Department policies related to stops. On the evenings of April 20th and May 18th, the consultants attended the Commission meetings to describe their progress in determining time periods and benchmark locations for their study, as well as to answer Commissioners' questions. Lamberth is expected to begin intersection studies during the summer. In order to stay apprised of activities on the study and to provide valuable input, the Commission will continue to have meetings with Lamberth Consulting as the project progresses.


Goals

The Community Racial Profiling Commission continues to work with Lamberth Consulting to ensure that the design and implementation of the traffic stop study result in an accurate report on the status of vehicle stops in the city of Sacramento. The Commission will also continue to work on ensuring effective community engagement related to the study, including planning to convene a one-day workshop, facilitated by Lamberth Consulting, featuring dialogue between members of the Police Department and the public.
