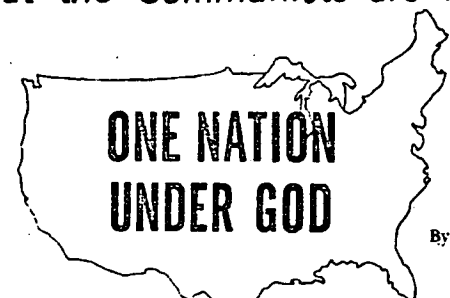


# IMPORTANT – PLEASE READ

# America: The Sovietizing of America <sup>A Humbug</sup> Soviets get a glimpse of life in River City

President Reagan sat across the table from Soviet General Secretary Mikhail Gorbachev discussing nuclear weapons, human rights and Afghanistan.

Mayor Anne Rudin sat across from four visiting Soviets on Thursday talking about light rail, state smoking bans and government in general.

Rudin sponsored the tour at City Hall during their four-day stay here. The Soviets, who arrived late Wednesday from Moscow, leave Sunday for Cheyenne, Wyo.

"This is the first time we've had a (Soviet) group here," said Stephen O'Mara, spokesman for the World Affairs Council, which arranged the Sacramento visit in conjunction with several other Sacramento-area groups.

The four visiting Soviets have apparently ordinary professions — an ophthalmologist, a pediatrician, an ecologist and a factory worker.

"They aren't really here to stimulate a political image," O'Mara said. "It's very much an exchange between individuals and citizens."

California has two groups of four visiting Soviets, both part of the "Soviets, Meet Middle America" program, sponsored by the San Francisco-based Center for U.S.-U.S.S.R. Initiatives. Yreka has the second Soviet group.

CUUI is bringing 400 Soviets to 240 U.S. cities this year.

"These are people who have never been here before and have extremely limited contact," O'Mara said. "They are not well-traveled politically, but they are enemies."

"I think they view the U.S. as we believe it to be, beyond the rhetoric and beyond the Cold War." <sup>2 good prize</sup>

ever, does not appear to be insurmountable for the four families who volunteered to play host to the group.

"We chatted a little bit, but I haven't seen him much today," said Georgene Tarble, who is sponsoring 32-year-old Mikhail Kozeltsev, a Moscow ecologist.

"We talked about some of the water situations in the Sacramento Valley and we'll take him to see some of the developments in the area."

Tarble and her husband visited the Soviet Union in 1977 and said the two-week visit helped them only slightly in understanding Soviet life.

The Sacramento tour included stops in the state Senate chambers, a Rotary luncheon and a visit at the Almond Growers Exchange. The four Soviets will meet today with some faculty members at the University of California at Davis.

## Soviets get a glimpse of life in River City

During the 45-minute City Hall visit, pediatrician Viacheslav Shevlyakov talked briefly about acquired immune deficiency syndrome in his country. <sup>Sodomite legacy</sup>  
"We have about 40 or 50 patients and several hundred with blood tests that are positive," he said. "AIDS is a problem."

Others mentioned alcoholism, which is considered rampant in some sectors of Soviet life, and how their local governments are operated.
