L.A. offers comprehensive services and has placed thousands of individuals & families into permanent homes annually.

Here are three of the most impactful homeless contribute to their effectiveness:

in the U.S., along with the points that

1. Built for Zero (Community Solutions)

Why It's Effective:

- **Data-Driven Approach:** Focuses on real-time data to understand the needs of individuals experiencing homelessness.
- Collaboration: Brings together stakeholders, including local governments, nonprofits, and housing authorities.
- **Success:** Over 100 communities participate, and some have achieved "functional zero" homelessness for specific populations, such as veterans.
- Scalability: The program is designed to be replicable across diverse cities and counties.

2. Housing First (Pathways to Housing and National Alliance to End Homelessness)

Why It's Effective:

- Core Philosophy: Prioritizes immediate, permanent housing without preconditions (e.g., sobriety or employment).
- **Evidence-Based:** Proven to improve housing retention rates, reduce costs, and improve quality of life.
- **Flexibility:** Tailored to meet individual needs, offering services like mental health care, substance abuse treatment, and job training after housing is secured.

3. LA Family Housing (Los Angeles, CA)

Why It's Effective:

- Comprehensive Services: Combines housing solutions with supportive services, including employment training, mental health counseling, and substance abuse recovery.
- Partnerships: Works with local and federal programs to leverage resources efficiently.
- Impact in Scale: In a city with one of the nation's largest homeless populations, LA Family Housing has successfully placed thousands of individuals and families into permanent homes annually.
- **Innovative Models:** Pioneers in bridge housing to transition people from emergency shelters to permanent housing.

Key Points of Success:

- 1. Focus on Permanent Solutions: Programs like Housing First emphasize stability through permanent housing rather than temporary shelter.
- 2. Tailored Support Services: Holistic programs that address underlying issues like addiction, mental health, or unemployment are essential for long-term success.
- 3. Collaborative and Scalable Models: Built for Zero's community-driven, scalable approach ensures adaptability to diverse settings and populations.

To Sacramento City Council:

Benito Juarez Association board did some research data to compare City of Sacramento to City of San Jose. Benito Juarez Association challenges the new city council to make measurable outcomes and improvements in Sacramento housing and housing the homeless.

THIS IS THE CRITICAL INSIGHT THAT MUST BE INSTILLED BY THIS NEW CITY COUNCIL & THESE PLANS MUST BE FURTHER ESTABLISHED IN SACRAMENTO TO MEET THE NEEDS OF THE HOMELESS.

Comparing recent spending on homelessness and housing programs in Sacramento and San Jose highlights significant differences in funding use and accountability, according to recent audits.

Sacramento has allocated considerable resources toward emergency shelters, affordable housing, and outreach services. <u>However, it still struggles with transparency and effectiveness in tracking outcomes.</u> In contrast, San Jose received millions in funding from state and federal sources like the Homekey and HHAP programs, yet a recent audit found the city lacking a clear reporting system. <u>Over \$50 million remains unspent</u>, with delays in utilizing funds for converting hotels into housing. Both Sacramento and San Jose have similar issues with monitoring program efficacy, with much of the funds going to outside providers without robust outcome evaluations

Overall, a substantial portion of funds in both cities has been directed toward service provision rather than direct housing placement, with audits recommending stronger accountability and reporting structures to improve the impact of homelessness interventions.
