In our EKG area there are many problems with space. 1) Our pateints have to wait in the hallway of the hospital . 2) In one of our treatment rooms , it is in the back of our office. The patient has no privacy to discuss their heath with the doctor, get undressed, be tested unclothed without people opening the door. 3) Our other room is so filled with equipment that you can not move around 4) When the equipment is not in that room, it spends the day in the hallway. Even with all the restrictive space that we as employees have to put up with, I feel, the attitude and responsiveness of my staff has to be commended because they are maintaining a high quality patient care level with all space inadequacies they are dealing with.

I am proud to be an employee of Sutter and especially working with the new administration to help in any way I can. It is extremely difficult to serve our patients and keep the morale of the staff high under present working space provided. I urge your support as a consumer to support this request.

This is a letter to support our hospital's request for approval to remodel Sutter Memorial Hospital.

In the early 1970's the physicians who serve maternity clients and the administrative and nursing personnel of the department put forth a spectacular effort to bring our service policies from very traditional maternity care to the present.

We went from a <u>very</u> structured sequence of events during hospitalization to a more personalized pattern of care-based on input from the family. While these changes were of a philosophic nature, each change has brought hardship because of lack of space. If we are to continue our efforts, for the parents' benefit, we should only have to worry about limits of our professional capabilities--not whether the walls can be moved to give us more operating room.

This personalized pattern of care which we call our Family Centered Care Program encompasses several facets.

- a. Prenatal education We are fortunate to be able to offer parents several different learning mechanisms to prepare for the birth of their child. The classes in prepared childbirth, parenting, and nutrition are always full. We use every classroom available and have had to rent space "off site" to accommodate the need.
- b. Family involvement during hospitalization In response to requests for flexible policies that include, rather than exclude, significant family members we have moved to having the mother's support person be available during the hospitalization. This means that the father can participate in labor, delivery, and postpartum care of mother and infant. As a result, fathers spend

a good deal of time in the room with mother and baby. The room then is not a "private" room or a "semi-private" room, but a room that frequently holds several family members for hours of each day--but, the rooms are small.

Another aspect of family involvement, that took a chunk of valuable space, is the Home Style Birth Program. Again, based on consumer demand we changed a two-bed labor room to a one-bed family labor room to offer privacy for those parents who want minimal interruption during the birth process. If it were just the room it might not have been too hard; but, to support the program we needed meeting rooms several times a month to orient the families to the program, and we also needed office space for the nurse who makes post hospitalization home visits on mother and baby.

c. Neonatal intensive care - The philosophy of Family Centered Care permeates the intensive care unit. We care for not only the critically ill infant but also his family. But, because of lack of space we do not have a family sleeping room near the unit, nor do we have a room where parents can sit and talk. Therefore, we have to make do with finding an empty room "somewhere"--this is almost impossible to do.

There are two bits of humor that come to mind each time I go into the NICU (even though it is being remodeled). One is that the place is so small that nurses have to be a size 12 or less to work there; the other is that our department personnel are all heart—it's the plumbing that is in need of a triple coronary artery bypass.

In summary, our department is trying to deliver "state of the art" services in a physical plant that is archaic. As you know, several aspects of care are being handled off of the unit because we lack space. Utilizing other areas of the hospital impinges on the use of space by other programs. Hopefully this letter will add support to your request for remodeling. If I can be of further service do not hesitate to call me.

As an employee of Sutter Memorial Hospital, I wish to give my support and backing for the remodeling and expansion of Sutter Community Hospitals. Since I work in the Radiology Department of Sutter Memorial Hospital, my foremost concern is updating this area. Expansion and remodeling is desperately needed. There are no patient waiting areas, reception areas or private doctor's offices. There are very limited dressing rooms and storage areas. The employee's lounge needs to be enlarged and ventilated. I also feel that since this is a Cardiac Care hospital that there should be at least one designated x-ray room for chest examinations.

Facilities that work closely together should and need to be more centrally located. Such departments are the Emergency Room, the Laboratory, EKG and Surgery units. Most of all the Radiology department should include Ultrasound, Nuclear Medicine, and in the future Computerized Tomography.

Other areas of improvement should include Neonatology. This department is too small for the treatment and care of these high-risk patients. With the new treatments and techniques utilized there is not enough room for the equipment and staff to serve these patients. This is still true after the recent remodeling.

ICU, PICU AND CMU: These units are too widespread throughout the hospital. All these units should be localized into one area. This would allow patients to receive better care and treatment by the nursing staff, x-ray, respiratory therapy and physical therapy staff.

EMERGENCY ROOM: There are no proper waiting areas for patients and their families. Space is limited and there is not sufficient treatment and examining rooms.

DINING ROOMS: These need to be enlarged to accommodate our staff plus the family members of our patients.

HALLWAYS: The hospital hallways are hazardous to employees, patients and visitors due to the clutter of equipment, transportation devices, treatment carts, etc. This is caused by the lack of proper storage space.







As a long term employee I have seen many changes in response to expanding our facilities as our patient load increases. I believe we need to further expand our facilities in order to preserve this excellent patient care as we'll improve working conditions for our employees.

Our Open Heart program has doubled in the past five years and yet our Surgery suite is barely adequate to provide this service. We frequently have patients stay overnight in our PAR as there is not enough room to move them to the ICU. Also in the Surgery suite we have a very small office that four others share with the Supervisor.

I am a non-smoker and have no place to eat my lunch other than the womens' dressing area with the smelly shoes (The male non-smokers do not have even this). I can rarely find a place to sit in the non-smokers cafeteria as it is also in-adequate and also takes up a good part of my lunch time just to dress and get over there.

The storage for supplies in our OR is also at a premium and although we have cut inventory, revised and reorganized repeatedly, we must still have our hallways so cluttered it is a safety hazard and makes even the simplest job like picking a case a real inconvenience.

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As Sutter Memorial has been recently designated the major Cardiovascular (Open Heart up 60 cases over last years total already) and Peri-natology Center. I feel we owe it to our patients to provide them with the best facilities as well as the best care.



The Board of Directors and the staff of the Foundation Health Plan are keenly aware of the availability, quality, location, cost, and other factors involving health care delivery within our service area. The Sutter Community Hospitals form an integral part of our delivery system.

Consequently, any modifications, enhancements, construction, rennovation, and other activities generated by each or all of the Sutter Hospitals relate directly to the operation of our health plan. Accordingly, we want to make a number of general and specific comments on your plans involving the Sutter Memorial project and the Sutter General project...

As general background, the Foundation Health Plan is a Federally qualified and State licensed health maintenance organizaion. We serve the five counties of Sacramento, El Dorado, Nevada, Placer and Yolo through our headquarters in Carmichael. Our current enrollment is approximately 50,000 lives. We anticipate 65,000 lives by the end of 1982. Under contract are some 1,200 physicians plus many of the area ancillary providers including, of course, most of the acute facilities within our area. The FHP has been delivering quality health care since January 1, 1978. Since that time, we have also expanded into the four counties of San Joaquin, Amador, Calaveras, and Tuolomne plus we now anticipate additional expansions into adjacent counties. Since we provide services through contractual arrangements rather than the operation of our own facilities, our specific contract with the Sutter Community Hospitals represents a vital document in our arrangement for health care services.

We have reviewed a number of the documents, surveys, analyses, and proposals of the Golden Empire Health Systems Agency. We are somewhat more optimistic than the HSA on the economics of and planned growth for greater Sacramento. There is, presumably, a maldistribution of acute beds and, perhaps more important, a forthcoming shortage of beds particularly in specific areas and for specific services.

We are most supportive of your plan for the Sutter General Hospital expansion. With our large enrollment population in Sacramento County, Sutter General is located ideally for Foundation Health Plan utilization. The planned facility certainly needs parking. The shifting and/or increase in the number of beds by 140 seems most prudent and proper. The hospital bed mix you have outlined seems to conform with the Foundation Health Plan population and medical-surgical requirements. We are most concerned too with plans for your perinatal and pediatric delivery system since certain of your services are not available at other facilities in the area. It would seem apparent that your plan for Sutter General and Sutter Memorial are unalterably intertwined. This is logical and the conclusions appropriate.

The Foundation Health Plan markets principally to employer-union groups with a typical demographic mix of age, sex, etc. However, we also offer a prepaid Medicare program with an expanding enrollment. As we develop Part A services for Medicare, there will be further emphasis placed on the health care services offered to the elderly and Medicare covered infirmed.

The Foundation Health Plan will utilize approximately 20,000 acute bed days in calendar year 1982. Approximately 35 percent or 7,000 bed days are provided by the Sutter Community Hospitals. We anticipate that this will grow to a figure in excess of 10,000 bed days in calendar year 1983. Should we develop additional programs in the Medi-Cal, CHAMPUS, or other environments, the increase would be most dramatic. Based upon this information, the Foundation Health Plan Board of Directors has authorized this letter of support to Sutter Community Hospitals in its general plans to expand, enhance, and modernize the Sutter Health Care Facilities. Should you require any specific comments or recommendations from the Foundation Health Plan, we will be more than pleased to cooperate.

Dear Mr. Parrington:

I have attended meetings regarding the proposed building and/or remodelling pf the two Sutter Hospitals, and feel that I must write to give my personal support and encouragement to all the projects.

I have been employed as a Medical Technologist by Sutter Memorial for the last 16 years in a position which brings me in contact with all the hospitals in Sacramento County personally, plus other hospitals in Northern California through the services my department offers. This, I believe, gives me an allover look at the total services offered by other hospitals and a basis for comparing Memorial with all these hospitals. My department offers a service unavailable in any other private hospitals in Northern California. As a result, we serve approximately 25 other hospitals in both Nevada and California on a regular basis.

Ithink that much of Sutter's growth is because of our excellent staffing with vital persons at all levels. Our continuing education programs are encouraged by the hospitals. This brings new ideas, tests and equipment to our hospitals for better service and health care. Centralizing some of our tests makes it financially feasible to offer them for diagnosis. The costs would be prohibitive for every hospital and laboratory to perform every test that is available--many of which are required rarely, but essential for finite diagnosis.

However, nearly all our departments are working under the disadvantage of limited space. I can practically stand in the middle of my department and file, type, perform tests, use my microscope, and wash up without taking more than one step. In the past few years my work load has increased nearly 20% per year, creating problems in such a small space. I am sure the same is true throughout the hospital. To keep up with improved health care and modernizing, more space is essential.

The future plans for Sutter Community Hospitals does not necessarilly mean an added traffic pattern, it means better and more efficient health care for the entire Sacramento area.





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
Dear Mr. Parrington:

I have been an employee at Sutter Community for 4 years, 3 of those years in Radiology. Just like many other people, I too am a victim of Sutter's long standing "lack of space" problem. When I go home in the evenings totally frustrated with my job, nine times out of ten it is due to the fact that there just isn't enough room in our department for us to do our jobs to the best of our abilities. Let me give you just a few examples of my working conditions. (I am a clerical worker in x-ray).

- I literally have to fight the crowd in the hall way to get from one office to the other.
- 2. In the sectretaries office there are 3 desks & 5 clerical workers. 3 clerical works share 1 desk!
- 3. Our lounge isn't a lounge anymore it's a storeroom. Boxes stacked to the ceiling. There's even a fold out desk in there now. (Somebody was lucky enough to find a cubbyhole for a desk!)
- 4. I trip over technicians in the lightroom when they are in between cases because there's no room for them to wait in the lounge.
- 5. I have to interrupt ultrasound and x-ray exams when I need supplies or records which are kept in the patient examrooms.
- 6. Patient records are not easily accessible. There are two off-site buildings in which records are stored. (Try explaining to a demanding doctor that it takes twenty-four hours to get films from the warehouse. Where's the warehouse?)
- 7. The worst of all is that there isn't a waiting room for our patients. The in-house patients sit in the main hallway & watch the traffic jam. Our out patients watch the oncology patients as they go down the hall on a gurney to the radiation oncology center. I don't feel that our in-patients should be exposed to the public, or that our out-patients should be exposed to in-patients. Some people just aren't emotionaly prepared to see the condition of some of our in-patients, like tubes, oxygen, gurneys, pain.

I may be the one who gets frustrated over the lack of space, but our patients feel the affects of it in the end. I truley appreciate what Sutter administration is trying to do to update our faucilities. I also appreciate the oppurtunity to tell you about my working conditions. Hopefully we can convince the public how


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badly our hospital needs updating. Not for our sake but for our patients.

Dear Mark:

I would like to take this opportunity to state my views concerning the proposed replacement of Sutter General and the expansion of Sutter Memorial Hospital.

Sutter General is a 1920's hospital that is trying to operate in a 1980's medical environment. The two are not compatible in any way. General has been renovated, reworked, expanded and otherwise remodeled to house the newer sophisticated mechanical and electronic gagetry of the space age. It is my opinion that we have gone as far as we can go. Sooner or later, one gets tired of spending copious quantities of money to keep "the 1920 model-A" running, especially when there is nothing left to keep running in the first place.

Quality medical care today dictates space age technologies and equipment unheard of ten years ago. True, the equipment is more compact than it was ten years ago; however, the number of required pieces has increased. For example, physicians order tests to determine levels of circulating hormones today that were not known to exist ten years ago — let alone sixty years ago! These tests require the best level of technology available. If Sutter does not possess this technology, then a great patient disservice is perpetrated.

All the foregoing reasons could be used as an argument for Sutter Memorial. Although it is a newer facility than General, it is fast becoming obsolete in its own right.

During my 15 years experience at Sutter Community Hospitals, I have had the opportunity to work in several nursing service areas in both the General and Memorial buildings. The general level of care and quality of service throughout the hospitals have been steadily high. I am proud to be associated with the long history of caring and effort to provide the best possible service available to our patients.

In the past 5 years, I have been working in an administrative capacity toward coordinating and organizing the care provided to renal failure patients, specifically dialysis patients. We have updated our equipment, supplies, and procedures to a level surpassed by few in the country. We have attracted qualified, exceptional people into our professional staff. With these best of resources available to us, our Renal Dialysis program remains fragmented and disjointed. The reason is clear; our multifaceted program has developed and grown over the past 12 years, the building and space available have not.

Consequently, our services have been "button-holed" into several small areas on unrelated floors. In an attempt to minimize costs we have avoided duplication of services between Memorial and General as much as possible. Some dialysis related services are available in one building, others in the separate building two miles away.

The design of the new Sutter General Hospital which includes the consolidation of Renal Dialysis services will greatly improve the care of dialysis patients. It will provide a setting for patients to receive all levels of care and all services related to their care in one location. It will fully utilize the professional staff time in job related activities rather than interruptions and time spent in commuting. It will allow for more efficient use of space, personnel, and supplies, and therefore be more cost effective.

The remodeling at Sutter Memorial and the new Sutter General are long overdue. My experience of poor space availability and its impact on the service we provide is not unique to Renal Dialysis. Our many other departments have continued to develop and expand over the years in space constraining areas. Our community needs up-to-date, readily available, and efficiently run health care facilities. Our current group of hospital administrators are dedicated, progressive, and informed. They work closely with each of us department heads and our staff, and therefore understand the needs of our patients and overall departments. They have kept me informed of their plans to develop the Sutter Hospital facilities through open internal meetings, neighborhood meetings, and numerous printed material such as the Plan For The 1980's, Sutter News, and several newsletter and newspaper articles.

As a professional nurse, a family member, a Sacramento resident, a Sutter neighbor, and a hospital employee, I support these plans to remodel Sutter Memorial Hospital and rebuild Sutter General Hospital. I want to see continued development and progressive changes in the health care services provided in Sacramento.



I am writing in regard to our need for a new Sutter General Hospital and a remodeled Sutter Memorial Hospital. As an employee of Sutter Community Hospitals, I am very aware of the desperate need for expansion in order to provide better health care for our patients. As an employee in the Cardiology Department, I am reminded every day of the vital part we play in the lives of people, not only in our immediate community but also in the lives of those who depend on our facilities from other areas when their own local medical care is not adequate.

Our department is located down a hallway of the hospital that is already being pushed for space. Between EKG, X-Ray, Heart Catherization Lab, Pulmonary Lab and our own department -- not to mention the "waiting areas" (chairs against the wall) for the labs, Emergency and Surgery -- its not unusual at times to have to work around anywhere from twenty to thirty waiting patients and their families/friends. The Heart Catherization Lab wheels patients in and out of the rooms all day, leaving them on the gurneys in the hallway to wait, for lack of a better place. All the other waiting people are in the same area, giving no privacy to the gowned and prepped patient, and only half of a hallway to move equipment and foot traffic through. I'd hate to think what would happen if we had to evacuate within three minutes! Equipment and machines from the various departments are left in the hall, as the small offices are not able to accomodate it all, and the workers too. (Housekeeping staff manages to work around all of this.)

One more recent incident this week that made me realize something must change is when four of our cardiology patients were unable to be admitted as scheduled because there were no beds to be found anywhere on all of the seven floors of this hospital. We need more room!! The Sacramento area is deserving of a hospital with quality care and adequate space to meet the needs of its growing population. Sutter Community Hospitals is an excellent organization

with a growing vision to meet those needs, and I believe it can be done if enough of us who see the situation up close will speak up in favor of the proposed expansion measures, as I am now. Thank you for the consideration of my views, Mr. Parrington, and here's hoping for a long and larger future for Sutter Community Hospitals.

There are no patient waiting areas, reception areas or private doctor's offices. There are very limited dressing rooms and storage areas. The employee's lounge needs to be enlarged and ventilated. I also feel that since this is a Cardiac Care hospital that there should be at least one designated x-ray room for chest examinations.

Facilities that work closely together should and need to be more centrally located. Such departments are the ER room Lab, EKG, and Surgery units. Most of all the x-ray department should include Ultrasound, Nuclear Medicine, and in the future Computerized Tomography departments.





I am writing this letter in support of remodeling Sutter Memorial Hospital and the building of a new Sutter General Hospital. I believe both of these projects are extremely essential in order to provide adequate health care for the community.

I am most familiar with the first floor at Sutter Memorial Hospital as I work in the radiology department. I believe this is the only radiology department in a hospital of this size that is located within the main thoroughfare and is without a waiting area for inpatients or out-patients. It can be easily seen that all patients are wiating in one of the main hallways of the hospital in wheel chairs and on gurneys, regardless of the degree of illness or discomfort. The poor location and inadequate number of dressing rooms results in out-patients walking in the same hallway often dressed in only a hospital gown.

There is congestion in every work area, even though every square foot of space has been utilized. Supplies are crammed into cupboards. The department supervisors office is shared by two other employees and also serves as a supply room. It is necessary to file films and reference cards while on a step-ladder as the files have nearly reached the ceiling.

Our ultrasound department is hindered as it has less than one-half of the needed space, inadequate heating and air conditioning and dressing areas consisting only of curtains suspended from the ceiling. It is located in the basement removed from the main department in an area unsuited for patient care.



I am writing this letter concerning the proposed plan to remodel the business Office area of Sutter Memorial Hospital. Hopefully, listing some of the reasons I think make remodeling not only justifiable, but necessary will help convince you that this is a matter that demands immediate attention.

The noise level in the office is very high. It is not because of excess or loud taking for no reason. It is because we have to outtalk each other in order to be heard. This is especially bad on the telephone. When I call patients to get pre-admit information I have to plug one ear and bury my head in a corner to hear what the patient is saying. I very often have to ask the patient to speak up or repeat what they have said.

√ sit in Booth 2 and this is where I must take patients to admit them. I take them back and request them to have a seat I often think what I would think if I were a patient or family. Being led to a little stall where there are two chairs but only room for one person to be seated would not strike me as a first impression to be what we term a "quality care" facility. (Especially after spending even a few minutes in our "center of it all" lobby) The booths are cramped, and patients have no place except their laps to put thier suitcases or other personal belongings. (Which makes it very difficult to sign) Squeezing in and out of their seats is a real problem and the wheelchairs which are kept directly across from my booth don't make it any easier. I have had many patients trip over a wheelchair as they leave or enter my booth. I have witnessed one family member actually fall down.

This is only the beginning. I think patients are entitled to a little bit of privacy when being admitted and when they want to discuss a problem or bill. With the noise, not only from talking, but from the plate machine, Xerox, phones ringing, and the constant thoroughfare past my booth, it makes privacy essentially impossible. There are so many people in so small a space a natient doesn't know where to find help. I have often had patients come to my booth looking for outpatient or Cashiers or another booth and I have to





redirect them.

I sincerely hope that I am not wasting my time in writing this letter. Remodeling of the Business office area is something that needs to be done not in the near future but right now. It will not only make it a more enjoyable place for Sutter Hospital Employees to work and most certainly raise their morale, but a better, more efficient place for patients to come to be admitted. First impressions are lasting ones and for a hospital that wants to come across as a Quality Care Facility the first impression is indeed a bad one.

Dear Mr. Parrington:

As you know, patients under my care are admitted to the maternity unit at Sutter Memorial Hospital. This first free-standing perinatal care facility in California is approaching its fiftieth birthday. While Sutter Memorial Hospital is still respected for the quality of its perinatal services, many problems due to an aged facility require prompt resolution. Included in these is the increased service load (projected at 7,000 deliveries by 1990), the increase usage of specialty services (e.g., newborn intensive and intermediate units, ultrasonography, fetal surgery, etc.) and the establishment and growth of a regional perinatal center program of service, education and research.

Patients commonly now must be separated from their families, labor in the recovery room, await space in the operating room and await available space for urgent admission because of an inadequately-sized and designed facility.

The need for a modern and more spacious facility for mothers and their babies has been accepted by hospital-based and outside planners, consultants, providers and consumers. A lack of support for this concensus by any regulatory body would portend an unsafe circumstance for clients requiring inpatient perinatal services.

I have been employed at Sutter Memorial as a perfusionist for the past 15 months. I have come to realize that this hospital is a tertiary cardiac center without the proper facilities to maintain optimum patient care. As of this date we have operated on 635 open heart patients utilizing only two operating rooms. If you consider the enormous quantity of disposable supplies that we perfusionists use alone, it will be obvious that storage is a real problem.

Another major problem that affects all surgery patients is the lack of a proper pre-surgery holding area. The present holding area, although an improvement on the past routine, is still rather uncomfortable for the patients. I imagine they must feel like they're on display and also an audience to the normal chaos that takes place at the operating room control desk.

Having been employed previously by a hospital that went throught the "pains" of expanding, remodeling, etc. I can't emphasize enough the difference in employee attitude which, in turn was passed on to the patient resulting in better patient care.

I could probably write on and on about the different areas which need attention such as Recovery Room, supervisors office space, room for OR supplies, housekeeping supplies, and conference room.

It is my hope that Sutter Hospital will not fail to take the proper measures to continue being a top notch service to the community.

As an anesthesia attendant for few months and before that a surgery attendant for a few years I am concerned about the lack of space in our department and some others facilities on the first floor such as the Recovery Room, ER, X-ray, to name a few.

I feel that a waiting room for each facility would solve the problem, or an area where patients could stay while waiting to be seen, instead of congregating in the hallway impeding traffic as they are currently doing. An enclosed holding area would certainly be welcome by the patients who are waiting for surgery. As it is, they are presently exposed to excessive noise and congested traffic.

Also, the area where I work (Anesthesia Room) is very limited in space and storage. There is not enough storage space for anesthesia supplies and it creates problems at times: the spare anesthesia machine is currently stored in the end of the hallway by the emergency exit and I feel that is not the properciplace.

I hope these suggestions will be of use in the future plans for remodeling Sutter Memorial for improved patient care and working conditions.

I feel that the proposed expansion and improvement plan for Sutter Memorial Hospital as part of the plan for the 80's is long overdue and it will greatly încrease our ability to provide good care to the many patients requiring our services.

As an employee in the Respiratory Services Department, I can attest to the fact that our departmental facilities are completely inadequate. Our 35-plus employees work out of a small room in the basement which is so crowded at report time that people cannot move freely around the room. This lack of space also hampers our ability to assemble and check out life support equipment such as neonatal, pediatric and adult ventilators and deliver them quickly to patient areas in crisis situations. We face these situations daily.

In terms of our own comfort and convenience as employees, at the present time we share one bathroom with Central Supply. We have no lounge area and no lockers. There is no place for a non-smoker to go to get out of the smoke except to the small dining room which is usually filled to capacity. As a non-smoker, I find this very irritating to my health!



I have been an employee at Sutter Memorial Hospital for the past 5 years. I have worked in two departments during that time; first, in dietary for eighteen months and then in Medical Records in the Archives division for two years, and now in the main office of Medical Records for one and one-half years.

In the dietary department where conditions were better, everything ran quite efficiently. Conditions in Medical Records are much worse. In Archives there is an extreme lack of space, poor ventilation, dusty environment and even mosquitos! The main office also has its problems — lack of space, poor ventilation, poor airconditioning and not enough room for sufficient employees. 



I have worked for Sutter Community Hospitals for several years. Over the years I have seen the hospitals grow in numbers of employees and numbers of services offered. Both Memorial and General are at the point where there is no more room to grow. Two years ago we did not have the off-site locations of CBO, Sutter Community Staff Offices, Bio-Engineering Center, Construction/Remodel, and soon, Purchasing. I feel these off-site locations isolate employees, decrease communications, and in many ways hinder the performance of patient services.

Sutter General Hospital is an old building with rice husks for insulation. Rooms are small and facilities are inadequate. The building can be remodeled, but we will still have an old building. 

There are no patient waiting areas, reception areas or private doctor's offices. There are very limited dressing rooms and storage areas. The employee's lounge needs to be enlarged and ventilated. I also feel that since this is a Cardiac Care hospital that there should be at least one designated x-ray room for chest examinations.

Facilities that work closely together should and need to be more centrally ocated. Such departments are the ER room, Lab, EKG, and Surgery units. Most of all, the x-ray department should include Ultrasound, Nuclear Medicine, and in the future Computerized Tomography departments.

I must agree with everything Bonnie Stoddard said in her letter to you. That the collection area of linen and refuse should be in the front corridor of surgery is deplorable. True these carts are covered with large plastic sheets but the smell remains and sometimes the plastic sheets are not large enough to cover the trash and linen even though pick up of the carts is frequent.

And it is very uncomfortable for patients and personnel to move through surgery corridors that are stacked with inventory, whether surgery gurneys, boxes of supplies, sterile supplies picked for cases or a multitude of other articles that find their way to surgery.

I feel embarassed for unsuspecting patients who come to Sutter Hospital for out-patient surgery and find themselves wheeled twice in patient gowns through the main hospital looby. Also there is nowhere for doctor and patient to confer privately, certainly not in the handicapped bathroom which we use as the out-patient changing area.

The Holding Area or Admission Area for patients about to have surgery, although better than what existed previously, is a source of noise and activity rather than the quiet admission area envisioned. Through this area move linen and laundry carts, surgery scheduling activities, surgeons, OR personnel, product representatives, etc.

Office space in Surgery is virtually non-existent. That any administrative activities are accomplished is miraculous.

I've worked in Sutter Memorial Surgery for nine years and space requirements have increased as have the variety and intensity of surgeries performed. If our high caliber of service is to continue we require more space in which to function.



We, the undersigned, who work in the Surgical Recovery Room at Sutter Memorial would like to give our support in favor of the remodeling for expansion in our hospital. The territorial we group produce and the second product.

The increase in cardiovascular and acute care surgical patients makes our lack of space very disconcerting. The acuity of these cases makes their stay in recovery room extended and the demand for monitoring equipment is also increased. These factors, plus the fact that we often have to care for patients for many hours due to lack of space in ICU, add to our congested environment.

The lack of beds in other areas causes an increase in the length of stay for patients who do not need our care but because they remain with us they are our responsibility.

Occasionally we have patients who need isolation because of infection or radiation. We are not able to isolate properly due to our lack of space.

The condition of our patients varies drastically. Consequently, the patients who are more awake are able to observe those who are critically ill. If we had more space, we would be able to segregate our patients according to their needs.

Our desk area is very limited and becomes very congested with doctors and staff members; this adds to the noise level and confusion in our small space.


We have very limited storage space and have to infringe on surgery's storage area. This has created a problem because our supplies are not readily available to us.

Sutter Memorial Hospital has played a major role in my existance for an even longer period of time for I was born there some 38 years ago. 
The O.B., Labor , Delivery area of Memorial appears run down and out of date. The elevator has been known to break down and can be frightening.





As you know, I have been working here at the Sutter Memorial Medical Record Department for the past two and one-half years. I feel that Sutter is by far a superior hospital. However, there are some real problems in providing good patient care.

The Medical Record Department along with many, many other departments at Sutter Memorial have absolutely miserable working conditions which in turn results in less than optimal patient care. These working conditions seem to enhance illness among our own employees. Many of the department designs (layouts) are totally inefficient which then requires more employee time and frustration. Many of us work in cramped conditions where employees are sharing desks which in the long run takes more employee time to get to the end result. In essence all of these above statements are showing how the departments are less than effective with the current working conditions.

There are also other problem areas that exist. One of which is the location of the Central Billing Office at an offsite area. This creates many problems for Medical Records, Business Office, etc. There is no direct contact and many communication problems as well as numerous delays in coordinating efforts with these areas. This seems to have a significant impact on the accounts receivable area.

I, along with many other Sutter employees, have had an opportunity to review the Sutter Plan for the 80's which includes the total restructuring of Sutter General and the remodeling of Sutter Memorial. 





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Dear Mr. Parrington,

If Sutter Memorial is to continue to provide the high standard of patient care for patients with coronary disease, remodeling of the coronary care unit is necessary. The present structure can not be remodeled because of building and fire codes.

The present unit has no direct visualization of patients. This creates many problems when dealing with acutely ill patients. We try to keep the most acute patients near the nursing desk. As the number of acutely ill patients rise, this is becoming an impossibility. In the last year the number of patients with arterial lines, swan-ganz lines and repirators has increased drastically. These patients need to be constantly observed. Many nursing hours are lost to the patient simply because of the physical lay-out of the unit.

At present we have no place, except the main waiting room for grieving families. It is not unusual for a physican to have to talk to these families in the hall. This is an additional hardship on the family, physician and nurses.

We also have no place for the nurses to get report from the other shift. If there is an empty patients room, otherwise we have to ask patients and/or families to leave the waiting room or if there are too many visitors we get report in the guerney area on 4-center. If that area is in use we must use the bath area on 4-East. I don't believe anyone can truly understand the implications of taking report on 12 critical patients after this search unless they have experienced it themselves. The stress level starts up at a very rapid rate after this start of shift.

There is also no place for patient conferences, physician conferences, or staff conferences.


I believe the community is becoming more aware of the shortage of nurses. If we are to keep nurses we must help decrease their job stress. Physical environment has a great impact on this stress. When a hospital is designed to let the nurse do her or his job in the fastes and most economical way it helps her give the finest patient care.

I hope we can convince the community and state that for patient care and safety we need a new unit.

It is a privileged responsibility to have the opportunity both as an employee and consumer to write a letter in support of remodeling Sutter Memorial Hospital and rebuilding Sutter General Hospital. In my twenty-one years of nursing experience from staff nurse through various administrative levels in institutions throughout the country, the patient care provided at Sutter Memorial is of the highest quality. The patient care at Sutter Memorial is on the same level as St. Mary's Hospital associated with the Mayo Clinic with which I was associated for twelve years.

As a consumer of health care, I would only choose Sutter Memorial or Sutter General to be admitted as a patient.



Dear Mr. Parrington:

We, the staff of Sutter Memorial Emergency Room, in order to provide quality healthcare services to the Sacramento community require a more efficient and larger patient care area.

For the size of this hospital, this Emergency Room is inadequate. Our patient volume compares with Sutter General and Mercy General, although our physical space is considerably smaller. Sutter General has 10 beds in 6 rooms. Mercy General has 14 beds in 10 rooms. Sutter Memorial has 7 beds in 3 rooms.

Our waiting area is a wide spot in the hall, our nurses have no place to sit while charting, there is no place for the staff to discuss patient care in a confidential manner, our doctor's office is a remodeled bathroom, consequently there is no staff bathroom, our Head Nurse shares her office with the OB-GYN patients and our admitting clerks and unit secretaries share the same 5' by 5' working space into which is crowded two typewriters, a platemaker, 3 telephones, 3 office chairs, shelves for forms, a storage cabinet, a refrigerator, an emergency radio transmitter, and a copy machine.

Since this Emergency Room was opened 8 years ago, many empty promises have been made with no action. All of the Emergency Rooms in the city have been remodeled or improved since this facility was first deemed inadequate in 1975. We feel that no plan for the 80's could be complete without modernizing this facility.

If you have never been in Medical Record Department, let me enumerate a few of the problems of working in Medical Records.

I. SPACE

a. 14 full time employees on Shift I and 11 full time employees on shift II with a total sharing of desks. This means that everyone of shift I must leave immediately as there is no room for the second shift if they don't. This leaves communications between the two shifts almost nil - there is no room for such.

Shift II and III have almost identical problems, although there are fewer employees, it remains that the key areas remain just as crowded.

II. AIR CONDITIONING or rather the LACK of it; is a MAJOR problem. You can turn to slush ice in 30 minutes by sitting beneath the vents or be roasted to medium rare if your desk is in a corner and the result is excessive sick time.

The working conditions in this department are deplorable. The only factor that makes it tolerable to work here are the personnel within the department. There is not enough work area and not enough storage area.

Yes, I, along with the rest of the employees here feel that it is imperative for Sutter Hospitals to take an objective look at the working conditions and the impression that Sutter Hospitals present to the patient and the public.

During the many years I have been employed at Sutter Memorial Hospital, I have witnessed many changes in patient care but few changes in structure since the East Wing was opened.

Since our becoming a Perinatal Center, the maternity facility is more inadequate and outdated. All departments are in need of more space to provide the specialized services: labor/delivery area, delivery rooms, nurseries and patient areas.

The number of vascular surgeries are increasing, thus creating a need for more monitor beds. Many times it is necessary to move patients at any hour, perhaps more than once; this frequently causes a strain between hospital staff, patients and family.

Our emergency room use has greatly increased over the past few years. There is an urgent need for examining rooms and family waiting areas.

All departments providing out-patient services are lacking in waiting areas; most consist of chairs placed in a hallway.

Dear Mr. Parrington,

I have been employed at Sutter Memorial Hospital for the past eleven years. I have found working here to be enjoyable and rewarding professionally. While Sutter Hospitals have been known for their traditional high level of care provided, I believe this level could be even better with the changes proposed. Additionally, I have had patients tell me how depressing they found the old small rooms at Sutter General; particularly when compared with the new rooms at Sutter Memorial.

I currently work in C.M.U. at Sutter Memorial Hospital. In my opinion, the physical setting in C.M.U. tends to add extra stress in the care of these critically ill patients due to a lack of direct visualization of most patients. I am aware that cur present location was to have been only temporary, but we have been in this location for approximately seven years now. While we are receiving up to date equipment, it is obvious to be truly efficient and effective we must address the need of a total new physical plant, which can reflect current and future advances in care of the coronary patient.

On a personal note our family had a very unhappy experience in the spring of 1980. My 95 year old grandfather fell and was quite ill. His physician tried for two days to get him into a hospital in the Sacramento area. We were finally able to admit him to U.S.D. Medical Center. He did receive good care, but many lab studies, krays, etc. were repeated due to his having a new physician. He was very unhappy about not having his family physician that he has gone to for the last 20 years. We also found the cost of his care to actually be higher than a prior admission to Sutter Jeneral earlier in that year.

I have a great deal of difficulty in understanding how the Golden Empire Counsel can say that we have too many beds. Not only based on this one personal experience, but the fact that in J.M.U. we rarely have an empty bed. It often seems that a large percentage of my time that should be spent with patients, is spent on the telephone trying to move patients to admit new patients. These admissions are not only patients from our community, but we receive calls for beds from all over northern California.

I strongly urge that Sutter Community Hospitals be given a certificate of need to carry through the promosed "Plan of the 80's". Only by making these changes can Sutter Hospitals hope to continue their role of excellence in providing health care for the communuity.

Dear Mr. Parrington;

I wish to take this opportunity to identify some areas of critical space shortage existing in the Operating Rooms of Sutter Memorial Hospital. As a Head Nurse and long time employee of Sutter Community Hospitals, I am very keenly aware that it has always been the goal of Sutter Management to deliver highest quality patient care. Under the existing conditions, due to the lack of space, I feel this reputation is being compromised.

The first and perhaps most deplorable situation exists in the present system of handling refuse and linen used during care of the surgical patient during operation in the operating room. The contaminated refuse and linens are placed in large bins in the front corridor of the surgery department to be picked up by the housekeeping and laundry personnel, respectively. The patient entering surgery, and, indeed any visitors to the Department, must pass this unsightly and unsanitary situation in the corridor. After leaving the surgical suite, the refuse and soiled linens must be transported through the main halls to elevators, and eventually to their destinations. A collection area and an outside access is needed at the rear of the Surgery Department.

There is a severe shortage of space for supply storage. A large portion of supplies, both sterile and unsterile, must be stacked in the rear corridor of the department. The flat hand trucks used in transporting the supplies from the storeroom, are currently used to bring supplies into the operating room area. Ideally, all supplies should be removed from the cartons which have been handled by numerous teamsters accross the nation and exposed to various uncontrolled environmental conditions, before they enter the area of the operating rooms. In addition to providing a potential source of contamination, the storage of supplies in the corridor in this manner is in strict violation of State Fire Codes and other safety regulations.

In spite of the fact we perform surgical procedures on 40-50 Out-patients per month, our patients must undress in a bathroom designed for the handicapped person and be trans-

ported by wheelchair through the main lobby of the hospital and into the surgical suite. When the procedure has been completed, they are taken back through the lobby per wheelchair to the bathroom, where they re-dress and are dismissed. There is no private area where the Surgeon may speak with the patient or a family member regarding future plans for care or the results of a frozen section, etc.

We do not have a quiet, secluded holding area for the patient undergoing surgery. The corridor area in which they must wait, is the center of activity in the Operating Room Suite. Nearby, there are five telephones ringing constantly, and an inter-com system, which serve as communication center for the department.

The scheduling and business office is a room approximately 10 feet square, with no ventilating system except for an open door, and it is almost impossible to hear well enough to obtain the vital information necessary for scheduling the surgical procedures, with the door open.

The next area of concern, though not so directly related to patient care, is the lack of office space. At the present time, an area approximately 16 feet square is shared by the Assistant Director of Operating Rooms, two Head Nurses, two Assistant Head Nurses, the In-Service Coordinator and a Secretary. Not only is the room wall-to-wall desks, but when ever there is an occasion for private conference, such as employee counseling or evaluation, leadership or committee meetings, everyone must disrupt his or her work and vacate the area in order to provide the private setting. In addition to the above, there is no space available for meeting with the supply or product representatives except in the front corridor, which only adds to the noise and confusion around the holding area.

Perhaps this will give you a rough idea of the critical shortage of space in the Operating Room of Sutter Memorial. In addition to those areas mentioned, others do exist, such asinadequate locker room space for both medical and nursing staffs, cleaning equipment such as mop buckets must remain in the corridors, hampers and tables, as well as other equipment lining the hallways, etc.

With approval of the expansion plans which have been submitted in "Plan For The 80's", I am confident we can continue to provide the Sacramento Community with the outstanding quality of patient care it so rightfully deserves.



My family has had over 30 years of health experience with the Sutter Hospitals and my remarks are based on this consumer history, as well as, my professional experience as a Sutter employee over the last six years.

My family, as well as, many families in Sacramento have come to expect the highest level of care from Sutter Hospitals. I am willing to compromise my expectations for quality in many areas of my life but my family's health is not one of them. In my close association with cancer families over the last six years I have witnessed this same attitude from the people we serve, over and over again.

There are many factors that contribute to this quality and significant among them is the physical environment. Cur physical plant simply no longer supports our staff adequately. While we have made accommodations, there is a limit to the adjustments we can make. At some point in time in the near future the quality of care we offer will suffer. If this should be allowed to occur Sutter's losses will not be nearly as great as the losses to our community.

In addition to my general support for Sutter's construction plans I would also like to commend Sutter on the planning process:

1) Sutter has made a commitment to several specific care areas which ultimately will reduce some of the past duplications of services in our community.





- 2) Sutter has always remained open to community input. I have attended every community meeting regarding Sutter Memorial except one and feel Sutter has made a genuine effort to respond to community concerns.
- 3) Sutter, through the development of programs such as Sutter/VNA Hospice Care, has demonstrated its commitment to cost effective alternatives and cooperation among health care providers in meeting the needs of Sacramento.

The need is great and the concern for ourselves and our families is genuine. I strongly support the construction as proposed at this time by Sutter Hospitals.



Dear Mark,

I would like to take this opportunity to express my continued support for the development and upgrading of the services at Sutter Memorial Hospital. In order to provide a modern and effective health care delivery system to the community many changes must occur in the physical structure of the facility. Remodel and construction are mandatory, not a luxury. As a long term employee of this hospital, I have seen many changes in leadership and some remodeling. The forward thinking and action of the administration and Board of Trustees requires an organization of equal forward motion.

Sutter Memorial Hospital has long been the leader in Perinatal Services and Cardiology in the community. These services have grown and developed to meet the needs of the community and at this time can no longer expand or develop to accommodate the demands. The expertise of the personnel and the medical staff is not being utilized to its maximum due to lack of private counseling rooms, educational facilities, meeting rooms, adequate waiting areas, adequately sized patient areas, and sufficient treatment and examining rooms.

I have had a son and a daughter in the "old maternity building". OLD is the only word for it. Remodeling, at an emense cost, has brought the area as much up to code and the 20th Century as possible, but it is still inadequate. I am amazed at the quality of patient care provided, in spite of the physical plant. The space for rooming in, parent and sibling participation, waiting rooms, etc. is insufficient, especially for one of the highest usage maternity facilities in California. Hundreds of thousands of dollars have gone into remodeling of a facility that can never come up to the technological standards of the 1980's, let alone the plan for 1990's. The plant "as is", simply is not cost effective for the use of manpower, equipment, or supplies.

The other main area of interest to me and personally frustrating is the critical care or ICU/CCU beds in this facility. We have the most active cardiovascular surgery program in Northern California, yet we have totally inadequate square footage for the immediate recovery and post operative care of these patients. ICU's are not a thing of the past, they are the standard of today for the care of the critically ill and most probably, the foundation of acute hospital care in the future. Today's technology has leap-frogged the state-of-the-art at Sutter Memorial Hospital. Plans must be implemented now for the future—even with that, the real challenge of keeping up with advancement must be continually addressed. Services

could be grossly improved, streamlined, and upgraded for the critically ill patient. Technology should be available as a tool to enhance the care provided by the clinician. The manual data collection and entrance of all patient information into the medical record, the cutting out of tiny, sporatic bits of cardiac rhythym samples, the collection of laboratory values and a myriad of other reports necessary to manage the care of the critically ill and initiate possibly life-saving treatments is truly archaic.

The existing facility cannot be remodeled any further to bring the level of care to that required in the 1980's without an excessive expenditure of funds and a severe curtailment of existing services. Even with that, the space would be inadequate. Families would still grieve in the public corridors or be counseled by physicians and clergy in the hallways due to lack of private space. Renovation and additional construction is mandatory if this facility is to meet the demands of the community it serves. Further delay will only result in further waste of monies to keep up with the codes and regulations imposed upon the organization by the City, the County, the State, and the Federal Government.

I am an employee, an East Area homeowner, and a consumer of medical services. The plan for development and construction was needed five years ago and approval cannot be delayed any further if this community is to be served. I wholeheartedly support the actions of Sutter Community Hospitals and especially those of Sutter Memorial Hospital in planning for the future and attempting to improve the quality of care provided to the Sacramento community and those dependent Northern California communities.





Dear Mr. Parrington,

Thank you for giving me an opportunity to identify some areas within the Department of Surgery and Recovery Room that cause me much concern and are extremely cost defficient.

The first and perhaps most unacceptable factor of our present space problems is the lack of privacy and high noise levels for patients in the holding area. This problem could be eliminated if the unit was completely contained and independent of the main hallway which is the center of all activity. My original proposal of glass automatic doors on either side of the present holding area has not been considered at this time. The suggestion from Mr. Haas' office to include the holding area as part of Recovery Room encountered many problems, i.e. air conditioning, etc. Whatever the suggestions are and from whomever, something needs to be done in the 80's to address this problem which will become more grave as we increase the types and numbers of surgical patients.

Another problem that in 1981 is a health hazard is the antiquated method of garbage and linen removal from this department. Our present method utilized by Housekeeping and laundry entails the manual removal of these items via noisy dirty trash bins clear across the patient holding area. An automatic drop off system for both these items is imperative for all purposes.

Last but not least, the overall space problem within the Department leaves something to be desired. Lack of privacy and space for both the physician and myself is a chronic problem. I personally have to share an office with four other individuals. Thinking, budgeting, discipling, planning, managing and counseling which are only some of my duties is a constant hassle. Sometimes the high pressures of this job and those of my staff and the physicians become explosive and there is no place to dissipate and dissolve it in a manageable fashion. The doctor's lounge is also small and inadequate for transcription of surgeries, professional conversations and consulting. Expansion of this facility on the same level as the nurse's lounge is imperative if we want to continue to keep the M.D. population that brings the patients and monies to this institution. The size and configuration of the present Recovery Room is also lacking in the efficiency particularly as it serves as a back-up for I.C.U.

I know all of these cannot be solved, but <u>attention</u> to the present state of affairs in a revenue producing department is critical. More important, partial resolution through imaginative and careful planning which is your thrust is possible and anticipated.



Having been a Sutter employee for several years, I have had an opportunity to witness the tremendous growth and addition of new health care services provided for this community. While many new programs and concepts have developed, our physical plant has remained the same since the East Wing opened in the late 1960's.

For several years, our Emergency Room has been open 24 hours daily- providing care and treatment to expanding numbers of patients, however, there is currently no space for physical expansion of that department.

As we have developed into a High Risk Obstetrical Center, our maternity wing is severely lacking in adequate patient rooms, delivery suites and nursery facilities.

The number of cardio-vascular surgeries performed has also increased greatly. We frequently have difficulty finding sufficient bed space in Intensive Care for their patients, as well as others who come in on an emergency basis during the night. It is not uncommon to have to make patient transfers from the Intensive Care Unit and the Coronary Monitoring Unit to accommodate emergency admissions.

Similarly, our Oncology Unit is generally operating at capacity patient load and often their patients must be placed in other nursing units until bed-space becomes available on the Oncology Unit.

It is frequently difficult for nursing staff to plan meetings, classes, counseling interviews, etc. due to insufficient
meeting rooms. Many shift reports are held in utility rooms and
waiting areas because there is no other available space. Many of
the head nurses have no office space to conduct the business of
their units or to have staff interviews, or performance interviews.

The proposed remodeling project seems vital to the ability of Sutter Memorial to continue its outstanding record of health care to this community.



I could continue describing problems for a number of jages. I will instead close by stating that the space limitations created by the existing building slow my job down and create safety dangers to my patients, the public and myself. By improving the building quality of care, efficiency, and safety will increase, and when these things improve, costs will

I have been on the staff of Sutter Community Hospitals for 29 years and a senior staff member for 27 1/2 years. I have always been a very loyal supporter of Sutter Community Hospitals. My office location was near Sutter General Hospital for approximately 13 years, and my present office location is essentially beside Sutter Memorial Hospital for the past ten years.

I feel that there is a great need to build a new Sutter General Hospital, to update Sutter Memorial Hospital, and to develop a new mental health center.

I am 100% behind this multiple venture as far as the hospitals and mental health care center are concerned, and I will give all the support that I can muster for this program. The only thing I cannot do to support the program, is to contribute money to the building program. My medical business has been very poor the past five months, and I am at the present time \$7000 in debt; even though I have a large medical practice, I work seven days a week. I live very frugally, and I practically never take a vacation. The economy in the world today is very very bad. The economy in the practice of private medicine in the Sacramento area is very, very bad. It has only been the last five months that I have suffered from patients being forced to discontinue my medical care and to enroll in Kaiser Permanente Hospital system. Certainly. MediCal has added a great deal to making our medical practice more difficult and much less profitable, especially from the standpoint that not too long ago, I waited 3 1/2 months before I got my first check from MediCal. MediCare also has put in some rules and regulations that is hurting our medical practice. Therefore, I am very pessimistic for the future of the private medical physician. I have had five bad months in my practice that helped to



prove to me that the future looks very bleak for the private physician. Anyway, I am all behind Sutter Community Hospitals and I will help in any way that I possibly can, other than from a financial standpoint, as I am 67 years of age, my health is poor, and I am unable to retire because I do not have money to retire on.





I am writing in support of Sutter Community Hospitals plans to replace Sutter General Hospital, renovate Sutter Memorial Hospital, and develop a new Mental Health Center.

As a staff anesthesiologist at Sutter Community Hospitals, I am very well aware of the fact that new facilities are urgently needed. My involvement with patient care is primarily at Sutter Memorial Hospital and in this facility we need new developments in the areas of cardiovascular surgery, obstetrical services, and perinatology. I have felt more than once in the past that patient care has been less than optimal due to limited space and equipment at Sutter Memorial Hospital. The space for installation of these medical services was just not available.

Sutter Community Hospitals was built at a time when the needs of the community had not expanded to its present state. The facilities at both hospitals were geared to patient care at a time when equipment was not as expansive and complicated. With modern day technology and the many advances in medicine, there is an urgent need to renovate or replace Sutter facilities to keep up with the demands of rigorous medical practice.

My experience at Sutter General Hospital has been pleasant. However, I have always been impressed with how precious little space there is to be obtained in the operating room suites. Those operating suites were designed for a time when anesthesia could be simply administered via an open drop mask. Anesthesia has come a long way since that time and we need the new equipment to make our anesthesia practice safe and efficient.

My contact with the Mental Health Services at Sutter Memorial has been limited to administration of general anesthesia for electro-convulsive therapy. Again, in this respect, the anesthesiologist was expected to provide anesthesia in a room that is half the size of a regular patient room.

To Whom It May Concern:

Irrespective of my involvement with Sutter Hospitals, it seems clear that anyone with an interest in Sacramento, especially in the inner city, would welcome an opportunity to bring improved, modernized health care services to that area.

Sutter General Hospital has a long history of providing excellent medical services to Sacramento with specific expertise in the area of geriatrics and orthopedics. The hospital is also making major efforts in the development of new and expanded services in the areas of rehabilitation and neuroscience, to name but two. If indeed there is a commitment to revitalize and support central Sacramento then the delivery of health care services to the residents of that area must play a major role. The physical plant at Sutter General is aging and provides real problems in supporting the new techniques and technologies that are required by current standards of health care. Over the last few years the position that Sacramento has too many hospital beds has been dramatically reversed and clearly we are seeing a need for more and diverse hospital services. In order to provide adequate medical support for the central city into the next century, we must be forward looking enough to support the development of facilities appropriate for the provision of these services. It is for this reason that the building program for Sutter General is so important to Sacramento as a whole.

Turning to Sutter Memorial, this institution has also played a critical part in the delivery of health care in Sacramento and the surrounding communities through its cardiac and maternity programs as well as its other specialties. However, it too has problems with its facilities. The maternity services are being supported through what was the first air-conditioned hospital in Northern California. This segment of Sutter Memorial is now, both from a space and facilities standpoint, inadequate to meet the projected load. The building program proposed for Sutter Memorial will have wide benefit to the community in that the mix of patient services available will be enhanced and overall operating efficiency and patient comfort will be materially improved. Additionally, with an opportunity to carefully plan the construction activities, the impact on the surrounding community should be a positive one.

Sutter Hospitals has for years enjoyed a reputation of providing quality medical care to the Sacramento area. It is only through continued modernization and development that the residents of Sacramento can ensure

themselves that they will have access to the very best of modern health care. Clearly every effort is being made on the part of the Sutter Hospitals to open and retain a sensitivity to the community and its needs, for we see ourselves as a part of the community. We are, in the final analysis, a nonprofit community hospital and in the long run our goals must be those of the community that we serve.

In all my visits to Sutter I have only two complaints:


- 1. Night care in your I.C.U. unit immediately after heart surgery.



Sutter Hospitals needs to enlarge the space available in patient rooms at Sutter General and outpatient services at Sutter Memorial. Many of my friends have commented favorably on the service received while patients in both hospitals, and have questioned when we were going to enlarge the patient rooms at General and waiting areas at both hospitals for families waiting for the outcome of surgery, and the results of outpatient tests, particularly, in X-ray at Memorial.

These may have been directed to me because I am an employee - - however, personal experience predates my employment by many years. My youngest son, my wife and my daughter all received excellent care in Sutter Memorial in 1961, 1963 and 1964. In more recent years, I have had occasions to wait for X-ray results in the limited waiting area at Sutter Memorial and to visit friends in the crowded rooms at Sutter General. A daughter-in-law received excellent care following surgery at Sutter Memorial in 1979.

I keep telling my friends and relatives that the Plan for the 1980's is a second attempt to improve patient rooms at Sutter General and the waiting areas at Sutter Memorial. I remind them that government regulations and neighborhood sentiments delayed the 1970's Master Plan for five years, making it too expensive (due to inflation of costs) to implement. I have also reiterated our desire, with their support, to minimize the time to get the Plan for the 1980's approved by the state agencies. They join me in anticipating construction completion in the next three to four years.

My experience in traveling between three off-site locations and the hospitals causes me to look forward to reconsolidation of off-site staff members at one of the hospital locations. This will reduce travel time and cost in the conduct of business.

As a member of the community and a six year employee of Sutter Community Hospitals I am writing in complete support of Sutter's Plan for the 1980's.

It is my responsibility to conduct new employee tours at both Sutter Memorial and Sutter General on a weekly basis. It is of grave concern to see patients lying on guerneys in the hallways outside Radiology and Nuclear Medicine waiting for procedures. Visitors accompanying Emergency Room patients must also wait in the hallways—often at a time of real stress or distress.

Office space is totally inadequate in many areas. It is not unusual to see four or five people officed in space designed for one. This "stacking" of personnel is not conducive to quality production or personal health.

The Sutter General building is approximately 60 years old and while every effort is being made to renovate and modernize, it appears vertually impossible to bring it to the standard of health care needed for the 1980's or beyond.

The Sutter Maternity Hospital also appears to defy structurally the needs of the technical sophistication needed for neonatology and perinatology.

Family members and friends who have been patients at Sutter General frequently remark that the excellent care and food is even more remarkable considering the dull, dingy appearance of the patient rooms.

I have frequently attended neighborhood meetings and feel that with few exceptions the community supports the Sutter Hospitals' Plan for the 1980's!

Having recently moved off site to enlarged quarters has increased my awareness of the space crunch and noise factors which the Sutter employees are forced to tolerate.



Due to overcrowding, various financial functions have moved offsite. a consequence, we have not always been able to provide financial information timely or efficiently. For example, much of the documentation for the patient information system is originated offsite. Since the actual processing of this information is accomplished at Sutter General, continuous problems arise in transporting, processing and returning these documents to their originators. Many of these problems would be most efficiently resolved by personal contact. However, physical separation of the parties involved requires that problem solving be accomplished by telephone. 

At Sutter I sense an imbalance which seems to generate labor intensity, less than desirable aesthetical surroundings and the inability to remodel in an economical manner to meet the needs of changing medical technology.

Having been involved in hospital engineering for more than twenty years at Sutter Community Hospitals I totally agree with and see the need for the replacement of Sutter General and the remodel at Sutter Memorial which is part of Sutter's plan for the 1980's.



In the capacity of Director of Materials, I have been directly involved with most departments relative to their supply needs/constraints. This involvement has graphically pointed out the need for development of a new facility at General and remodeling at Memorial.

Severe space limitations at General require frequent supply orders, placing the purchasing department and the hospital personnel under unnecessary pressure to maintain adequate patient care supplies. The storage on the nursing stations is anything but organized and accessible. This checkerboard method of maintaining supplies is extremely inefficient for the staff, taking time away from their main purpose; patient care.

Memorial, in spite of being a newer facility, suffers from the same problem of storage. Presently, there are three storage areas scattered throughout the hospital because areas such as nursery, surgery and CS cannot handle their supplies, resulting in increased labor and holding costs. This space could also be better utilized by the hospital.

Our central warehouse will be moving to an offsite location with increased capacity. This will help the situation somewhat, however, the severe physical constraints will still exist.

The plans for construction and remodeling are a necessity if the hospitals are to reduce patient costs through an efficient means of handling and storage of supplies.





Writing both as a current employee and a former patient of Sutter Community Hospitals, I especially feel the need for the construction of a new facility at the Sutter General location and an extensive update of the Sutter Memorial Hospital facility as well.

During the last four years, my work space within Sutter General Hospital has been changed six times — four times in one year — in order to provide space for patient care facilities. This in itself is very disconcerting and most counter productive. Along with the moves, each time the area has been located in a totally non-related work area of the hospital because that is where space could become temporarily available with as little inroad as possible on patient care areas. One of the locations was a space approximately 12' x 16' which housed six individuals, three professional staff members and three clerical staff. Efficient productivity in this setting was totally impossible.

A portion of my responsibility within the hospital revolves around representatives of the public sector including but not limited to patients and patients' families. Trying to provide a responsive and private atmosphere for this kind of contact is virtually impossible in the current facilities.

Because of small quarters and an inefficient floor plan, patients constantly are denied the privacy which should be accorded them in both hospitals. As you walk down the corridors or ride in the elevators, it frequently is with patients on gurneys either going to or from surgery or awaiting various procedures in radiology, etc. Having been a surgery patient myself, I have personally undergone this lack of privacy and it certainly is not desireable.

To correct this kind of a situation for the hospital personnel and also for the patients, the Sutter General Hospital building must be replaced to provide adequate space and more efficiently designed space. Sutter Memorial Hospital needs to have extensive remodeling to achieve the same purposes at that location. Without these changes, the staff of the hospital is hampered in the delivery of quality health care to the residents of the Sacramento area.


This letter is in relation to your memorandum of September 18, 1981-Plan For the 1980's.

This letter is written in response to your request for letters outlining the necessity for a new Sutter General and a remodeled Sutter Memorial. I strongly believe that the proposals are sound, and that the development is urgently needed.

It is doubtful that members of our community can deny the strength and importance of the multitude of services provided by Sutter Community Hospitals, nor the reputation for high quality care that Sutter has earned.

Sutter has been a leader in researching, developing and implementing health care programs at the time they are found to be necessary and vital to the community. These innovative services have been provided in response to stated community needs. Examples of Sutter programs can be found in Maternity, Neonatology, Perinatology, Oncology, Geriatrics, Mental Health, Peritoneal Dialysis, Urology, Eye Care, Hospice, Coronary Care, Orthopedics, Respiratory and Cardiac Rehabilitation, Neurology Intensive Care...and so on.

I believe that the building plans incorporated in Sutter's Plan for the 80's are closely tied to the continued provision of the number and depth of the programs available.

The critical care nature of many specialty services provided greatly increases the overall acuity of patients admitted. Thus, more space per patient for the necessary monitoring equipment and a larger number of staff per patient are required.

Already, space is a critical factor in determining whether or not an additional service may be added and the size of the program, or whether an existing service may be expanded. This is extremely limiting. The lack of room for growth affects everyone in each facility. The "space crunch" may be seen in clerical areas where employees are uncomfortably crowded together, in hallways which are crowded with supplies which has resulted from the lack of adequate storage facilities, in hallways where patients wait for outpatient services, in hallways which are used as a patient therapy area, and in the non-existence of private office space for Department Directors. The lack of space causes problems, discomfort and embarrassment to patients and their families, physicians and employees alike.

As a result of the space problems, a number of hospital departments have had to be removed to off-site locations. These departments have close working relationships with departments at each facility. The move to off-site locations has generated many problems such as loss of continuity in projects and follow-through, difficulty in coordination of work and/or paper flow, little parking space and decreased employee morale. Bringing these offices back on-site would resolve these issues and greatly increase effectiveness in operation.

The Plan for the 80's, while returning most programs to on-site locations, does call for moving the Mental Health program off-site. This service would actually benefit by moving to a facility well suited to the type of care provided. Also, this move would remove some stress to the neighbors of Sutter Memorial Hospital by greatly reducing the vehicular and foot traffic associated with patients of this high volume service and their many visitors.

State health planning agencies have generated and employed statistics forecasting a need for fewer hospital beds in the Sacramento area. These figures have been used to deny the necessity for Sutter's building plans. Those statistics have already been questioned as to their accuracy and reliability. Though agreeing that Sutter has been, and continues to be, a major provider of health care for the Sacramento community and the greater Sacramento valley, they see a reduced need in the near future.

Research conducted through Sutter's Planning Department definitely contradicts the projections of State planners and clearly seems to offer more dependable forecasts of community needs.

These considerations lead me to the conclusion that Sutter's building plans as outlined in the Plan for the 80's provides solutions to these and other critical health care issues. It provides for a high degree of community involvement, offers the space so necessary for continued provision of crucial health care programs, and gives Sutter Community Hospitals the ability to remain the leader in offering the excellent quality of health care for which it has become well-known.

To Whom It May Concern:

Irrespective of my involvement with Sutter Hospitals, it seems clear that anyone with an interest in Sacramento, especially in the inner city, would welcome an opportunity to bring improved, modernized health care services to that area.

Sutter General Hospital has a long history of providing excellent medical services to Sacramento with specific expertise in the area of geriatrics and orthopedics. The hospital is also making major efforts in the development of new and expanded services in the areas of rehabilitation and neuroscience, to name but two. If indeed there is a commitment to revitalize and support central Sacramento then the delivery of health care services to the residents of that area must play a major role. The physical plant at Sutter General is aging and provides real problems in supporting the new techniques and technologies that are required by current standards of health care. Over the last few years the position that Sacramento has too many hospital beds has been dramatically reversed and clearly we are seeing a need for more and diverse hospital services. In order to provide adequate medical support for the central city into the next century, we must be forward looking enough to support the development of facilities appropriate for the provision of these services. It is for this reason that the building program for Sutter General is so important to Sacramento as a whole.

Turning to Sutter Memorial, this institution has also played a critical part in the delivery of health care in Sacramento and the surrounding communities through its cardiac and maternity programs as well as its other specialties. However, it too has problems with its facilities. The maternity services are being supported through what was the first air-conditioned hospital in Northern California. This segment of Sutter Memorial is now, both from a space and facilities standpoint, inadequate to meet the projected load. The building program proposed for Sutter Memorial will have wide benefit to the community in that the mix of patient services available will be enhanced and overall operating efficiency and patient comfort will be materially improved. Additionally, with an opportunity to carefully plan the construction activities, the impact on the surrounding community should be a positive one.

Sutter Hospitals has for years enjoyed a reputation of providing quality medical care to the Sacramento area. It is only through continued modernization and development that the residents of Sacramento can ensure



Dear Mr. Parrington:

Having worked at Sutter General and on lEast in the Maternity wing at Sutter Memorial I feel that your Plan for the 80's is long past due. When I returned to nursing after an absence of fifteen years, I found conditions at Sutter General that I had not seen since the old L.A. County Hospital days. Even the barracks-type military hospitals had been more efficient and cheerful. Patients complained of the physical surroundings and antiquated equipment, but at that time were limited in their choice of hospitals. After Sutter Memorial was in operation, patients became more unhappy, voicing their resentment that while their hospital costs were increasing they were being assigned to facilities that were depressing and inadequate. Patient complaints added to frustration, stress, and job dissatisfaction of the nurses. Since all incoming nursing personnel were assigned to my station on 3West for orientation, I was made aware of the negative response workers had to Sutter General.

Although cosmetic changes have been made at Sutter General it remains a depressing, even hazardous, place for patients and staff. After my husband and son were hospitalized there, they refused to ever consider going to such a crowded, noisy, depressing place again. Both will enter any other hospital in Sacramento than Sutter General. I, too, feel the same way.

When I later worked in CMU/lEast in the Maternity wing, I found that patients whose critical physical condition demanded cheerful efficient surroundingswere being placed in a make-shift area. Space was inadequate and fire and safety laws/codes were being ignored. Patients and relatives felt the area was more like a holding-room area and referred to the facilities as a 'dark hole'. All this made the task of the CMU nurses to give total, quality care more difficult. Patients who were admitted to lEast (not in the Coronary Unit) have refused to get in bed after seeing their room. They demanded to be admitted to the main building or to be sent home.

An elderly, extremely hypertensive neighbor entered Sutter Memorial for exploratory surgery last January. This woman had been a patient in Sutter Memorial several times and was not unduly apprehensive before admission. After being assigned a room on lWest she became increasingly agitated and frightened about her surroundings. By evening she was calling her husband on the telephone continually. The family asked me to see her and try to calm her. Finally, with/ the assistance of the Evening Hour Supervisor and the nursing staff, we were able to quiet most of

her fears and she was somewhat reassured. In the morning the surgeons merely did a biopsy and re-closed. Her surgical progress was uneventful. However this person returned to her home somewhat aphasic, unable to walk without assistance, and had very little comprehension of events occuring in her surroundings. Today her symptoms have cleared somewhat, but not fully. Her husband remains bitter that a woman "was taken from hercheerful, comfortable home and put in that dark cell of a room".

The changes you have outlined for both hospitals appear to be well planned and should be most acceptable to Sacramentans who who will be consumers of your services. Your Meighborhood meetings and the Sutter News have been received with interest. I feel the implementation of your facility plans is very important to the community. Please let me know if there is any way I can be of assistance.

Working for Sutter Community Hospitals as well as being a concerned member of the Sacramento community, I feel it is imperative that Sutter improves its facilities. Both Sutter General and Sutter Memorial suffer from inadequate storage and work areas which, if not remedied in the near future, could begin to affect the quality of patient care in later years. The staff at Sutter cares about the patients and the community, and I feel we must take steps now to our changing environment.

I work in Data Processing, which is a support function for both Sutter Memorial and Sutter General. Although not directly involved in patient care, our area plays an integral part in the overall stay of the patients at both hospitals. We provide services and information to nursing and hospital staffs to enable them to concentrate more on the patients. Like many other departments we do not have adequate space and facilities to provide timely and proper information to other areas. If we do not have proper facilities to do our job effectively and take advantage of new and innovative technology, the quality of patient care will not continue to improve as rapidly.

Not being physically located in close proximity to other departments dealing with business functions also creates problems with communication and information flow. When tasks are not accomplished as efficiently as possible, the cost effectiveness of patient care is reduced.

I strongly support the plans for a new facility for Sutter General and the remodeling of Sutter Memorial. If Sutter is to continue to meet these challenges and be a leader in providing health care services, new and improved facilities are needed. In today's rapidly changing environment, it is important that Sutter also be allowed to change to meet those needs of the community. Sacramento deserves the best in facilities and care provided in the most cost-effective manner.



I am writing to add my name to what I am sure is a very long list of supporters for your efforts to modernize Sutter General Hospital. I believe that the Sutter health professionals have been working under adverse conditions brought about by an inadequate physical plant, and major changes are necessary to ensure the proper delivery of medical care. I could site several examples, the most obvious of which is the status of the current operating suites. They are far too small to house the equipment which is used on a day to day basis nor do they allow for adequate room for personnel. Although everyone appears to be doing their best under the circumstances, in certain instances these small rooms may actually be potentially harmful to the patient's safety in a variety of ways. Furthermore, the operating area does not allow for appropriate preparation for out-patient surgery, which we do frequently. They have done so to the utmost of their ability within the confines of the present physical facilities. These facilities constitute two separate hospitals, one of which is considerably over 50 years of age and the other closely approaching 50 years of age. The older facility, Sutter General Hospital, has been in need of replacement for many years and further attempts to upgrade it and still maintain code restrictions have become totally impractical.

The newer facility, Sutter Memorial Hospital, has been growing steadily and has been added on to several times, yet still remains inadequate to take the increased volume of the speciality type of medicine that has been its responsibility.

I wholeheartedly support the efforts of the Sutter Community Hospitals' adminstration and staff to seek regulatory approval for the renovation of Sutter Memorial Hospital and replacement of Sutter General Hospital.

As I'm sure you are well aware, the bed situation in the downtown Sacramento area has become increasingly tight over the past two years and there seems no respite in sight. There have been times in the recent past when there have been waiting lists at all three of the downtown hospitals which have been in double figures.

It has been my good fortune to have a quality hospital such as Sutter Hospitals at my disposal since I have come into practice in Sacramento, and I hope that I will be able to continue this relationship in the future.

It is apparent, however, that the facility at Sutter General has aged considerably and is clearly antiquated for its purposes and will require extensive renovation to become a state of the art hospital for the 80's for the patient population to be appropriately served. The x-ray facilities have fortunately been upgraded and the GE 8800 CT scanner has been a significant addition in that line. Unfortunately, this only covers a small aspect of the total problem. Moreover, the expansion of the hospital and its compartmentalization into subspecialty units and the modernization of the intensive care units is clearly the goal and need of the future. This is particularly important in light of the fact that the projections are that the population in the downtown Sacramento area will clearly grow, and it is also anticipated that Sutter Hospitals will become increasingly a tertiary referral hospital for the northern California area.

I certainly hope that the certificate of need will go through as it will be a significant boom to the health care of the Sacramento region in the 1980's and beyond.


I wish to add my vote to those of others who are advocating approval of Sutter Community Hospitals' Certificate of Need.





Dear George:

As a member of the Medical Staff of Sutter Community Hospitals for nearly 20 years, and Chairman of the Department of Radiology for nearly four years, I can state unequivocally, that I am enthusiastically in support of the plans for replacement of Sutter General Hospital with a new facility, and remodeling of the facilities of Sutter Memorial Hospital.

The architectural arrangement of the Radiology Department at Sutter General is inefficient in the utilization of personnel, equipment and space. A properly designed department could provide approximately one-half again as much service as the current design. There also are virtually no facilities for waiting room, office space, film storage, and other support activities. This is an intolerable situation in the modern practice of radiology.

The architectural design at Sutter Memorial is even more inefficient and outright hazardous with a major hospital corridor
running right through the middle of the department. This is
markedly detrimental to patient privacy as well as safety. There
is a totally inadequate amount of space for the increasing
number of cardiac catheterization procedures, and it will be
difficult to implement new modalities such as transluminal
angioplasty and thrombokinase infusion therapy. Ultrasound is
located in the basement of the hospital, at a distance from the
supervising radiologist, and placing patients in an undesirable
area of the hospital, both from esthetic purposes as well as
safety considerations. The lack of space at Sutter Memorial is
already resulting in decreased morale among the personnel.





The plans for replacement of Sutter General Hospital will rely upon modern architectural design which will emphasize improved function in the use of space. It will also decrease costs from maintenance of an old building and improve the environmental care of patients. At Sutter Memorial Hospital, this will be more a matter of rearranging space to achieve efficiency and safety except for the area of the maternity hospital which must be relocated for reasons of safety.

In closing, I would like to comment that I hope responsible bodies will allocate new numbers of beds that appear to be necessary in the community to those hospitals who have a proven track record of quality medical care. I hope these will not simply be destined for hospitals who are solely interested in commercial success and will siphon off higher paying patients, instead of delegating these beds to institutions who are committed to the overall welfare of the community.

I've been practicing orthopedic surgery in Sacramento for 24 years and throughout this time I have used all of the Sacramento medical facilities. A goodly portion of my practice has involved admitting and operating on patients at both the Sutter General and to a lesser extent the Sutter Memorial facility.

Over the years I have put up with the antiquated facility at Sutter General Hospital to which orthopedic surgery is restricted. Initially we were working in that hospital without air-conditioning in the operating rooms. Then in the early 1960's over an extended period of time air-conditioning was added. This as I recall took about 2 years to accomplish during which time the hospital was filled with the noise of jack hammers and dust. It must have been horrendous to have been a patient during that remodeling procedure.

Since that time other remodeling has taken place most recently for the addition of external fire escapes.

But you can't make a silk purse out of a sow's ear. Sutter General Hospital should have been dynamited 25 years ago and reconstructed at that time.

About 6 weeks ago I had the occasion to be an in-patient at Sutter General Hospital for disc surgery and I can attest to the fact that the Sutter Hospital facility is terribly antiquated. The nursing staff is great but the facility is like Folsom Prison.

Sutter has to be used because there are not enough beds in Sacramento for proper medical care without this facility, But the people of Sacramento I think deserve a better facility, one which is commensurate with the status of the professional and administrative staff at the Sutter Community Hospitals



I feel this is an essential community need - one that we cannot do without. Sutter General Hospital is old, needs a tremendous amount of annual work to keep it servicable, and I feel it would be a big boost not only to the care of the patients, but also to the morale of the nursing and medical staff, to replace it with a new facility. Sutter General Hospital has a fine reputation throughout the state, not only as one of the leading hospitals in California, but a facility in which optimal care is given to the patients and that the medical staff is of the highest caliber. I would hate to see this reputation diminish and I would think Sutter should continue to be a referral hospital for complex problems along with serving the community needs. I do the majority of my Sutter Hospital practice at Sutter Memorial Hospital and have felt very comfortable there since I have been in Sacramento. There are necessary renovations that have to come about at Sutter Memorial Hospital; the obstetric section in particular is very crowded, antiquated, and needs renovation to continue to be the leading facility for obstetrical care in northern California. I feel also that we should continue to upgrade the oncology and the cardiovascular programs and continue to meet the needs to let Sutter Memorial Hospital be a prime referral of patients for northern California.


I am writing you today in response to your letter of March 12th concerning the certificate of need project for Sutter Community Hospitals.
