

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LATE CLAIM APPLICATION OF WILLIAM M. GODATTI

Members in Session:

SUMMARY

William M. Godatti has applied for leave to present a late claim. We are of the opinion that the application does not fall within those circumstances under which relief must be granted.

BACKGROUND

William Godatti has applied for leave to present a late claim. His claim seeks damages for personal injury suffered while playing golf at Haggin Oaks Golf Course.

Government Code §911.2 provides that a claim for personal injury shall be presented within 100 days of accrual of the cause of action. Applicant's cause of action accrued on May 21, 1982, and the 100-day filing period expired on or about August 10, 1982. His late claim application was filed on September 22, 1982. Godatti's application states that he failed to file within the 100-day period because he was unaware of the claim filing requirement until he consulted an attorney after the 100-day period had expired.

ANALYSIS

A person seeking to present a late claim must show that the failure to file a timely claim was due to mistake, inadvertence, surprise or excusable neglect (Government Code §911.b(b)(1)). In order to obtain relief, it must appear that the applicant acted with reasonable diligence under the circumstances (Roberts vs. State (1974) 39 C.A. 3d 844; El Dorado Irr. Dist. vs. Superior Court (1979) 98 C.A. 3d 57). It does not appear that these standards have been met in the instant case.

Ignorance of the claim filing requirement and the 100-day filing period does not excuse the failure to file a timely claim. Roberts vs. State, supra; Tsingaris vs. State (1979) 91 C.A.3d 312. Nor does the failure to consult an attorney within the 100-day period does not exucse the failure to file a timely claim. Bennett vs. City of Los Angeles (1970) 12 C.A.3d 116).

Under the circumstances it appears that the applicant's failure to file a timely claim was not due to the mistake, inadvertence, surprise or excusable neglect of a reasonably diligent person.

RECOMMENDATION

For the foregoing reasons it is recommended that the application of William M. Godatti for leave to present a late claim be denied.

This claim is being filed on behalf of Mr. William M. Godatti, who suffered injuries while playing golf at Haggin Oaks Golf Course. However, it has only been since September 7, 1982, that I have been apprised of claimant's injuries and the failure to file a claim against the City within the 100 day period. Claimant did file an accident report at the golf course on the date of the accident, but he was unaware, until my discussion with him on September 7, 1982, of any need on his part to file a claim within 100 days.

Therefore, it is my sincere request at this time that the City waive its requirement of filing a claim within 100 days of his injury and thereby accept the claim attached hereto.
