


SUMMARY

This informational report summarizes the activities of the Minority/Women Business Enterprise (M/WBE) Program through the Third Quarter of Fiscal Year 1993-94 (FY 93-94), and presents cumulative statistical information about the City's utilization of minority/women business enterprises from July 1, 1993 through March 31, 1994.

SUMMARY, continued

As of the end of Third Quarter FY 1993-94, the City's M/WBE utilization level was 10.4% of discretionary expenditures made from the Operating Budget, and 3.6% of Capital Improvement Budget. Overall utilization rate for the Third Quarter FY 93-94 was 6.5%. The Subcontractor Utilization (by City prime contractors) on City construction projects was 27.3%.

The following table allows comparisons of Third Quarter FY 93-94 with FY 1992-93 Third Quarter and Year End reported levels. In the baseline operating budget reported expenditures, FY93-94 quarterly statistics resulted in an increased 1.2% third quarter utilization, and a .9% increased utilization from FY92-93 year end results.

A review of City Departments' Baseline Operating Budget M/WBE expenditures provides participation percentage comparisons, varying from 0% to 17.1%. Eleven of the seventeen departments realized an increased utilization level from +.1% to +9.0% in comparison of third quarters of FY93-94 and FY92-93. Ten departments realized increased utilization in comparison of the FY93-94 Third Quarter and FY92-93 Year End. (See EXHIBIT A: "Summary of Departmental M/WBE Operating Baseline Expenditures").

Reported CIP statistics resulted in a decrease of 1.4% from year end FY92-93, at the same time a .3% decrease in third quarter comparisons. Total M/WBE CIP dollars increased \$110,567, from \$1,133,699 to \$1,244,266, for third quarter period comparisons. Total CIP dollars for same periods increased \$6,057,007, from \$28,879,800 to \$34,936,807. (Equivalent dollar expenditure levels, for Operating, CIP, Overall, and Subcontracting, are reported in the comparisons tables provided under the "Background" topic.)

SUMMARY, continued

The overall percentage decrease in FY93-94 appears to be impacted by CIP statistics, with an increased budget in FY93-94, without a corresponding increase in absolute dollars spent with M/WBE firms. A comparison of FY93-94 absolute dollars and percentages with FY92-93 demonstrates a shift in CIP vs. Operating budgets and effect of overall M/WBE participation level. An analysis of the comparison tables presented on Page 8 illustrates FY93-94 CIP represented approximately 64% of the Total Budget in absolute dollars, and a 4% increase in budgeted levels in a third quarter comparison. In FY92-93 Third Quarter, CIP budget was 55% of total budget and 56% of FY92-93 Year End dollars. Total absolute dollars spent with M/WBE firms decreased 7% in FY93-94 from Third Quarter FY92-93. A rationale for a lower overall percentage involves increased CIP dollars, representing a higher percentage of the total budget, and decreased M/WBE expenditures. The effect is a downward impact of percentage participation.

It appears our most significant impact in this third quarter of FY93-94 has been in the Subcontracting of CIP projects. The subcontractor percentage represents awarded M/WBE's identified by Prime Contractors, and is reported at 27.3%, \$2,447,771 of \$8,966,283, representing a +22.4% increase from FY92-93 Third Quarter statistic.

This reported increase may be due to current tracking of M/WBE subcontracting utilization on the departmental level, where previously not tracked and/or reported. Example, Utilities Department was previously reported with Public Works Engineering. Not all Utilities Department projects were tracked and reported in Engineering. City Treasurer's Office has begun to track utilization (not reported here) and will be included in future statistics.

The direction at this time is to have other departments begin tracking other situations of utilization, previously gone unreported. That being the case, future reporting may result in significant impact on reporting levels and utilization rates.


BACKGROUND

The City Council established goals in 1988 to increase the amount of business the City does with minority-owned and women-owned businesses (M/WBEs). On March 30, 1993, City Council accepted M/WBE Utilization Study update, containing interim program goals and adopted interim goals for city contracts (Resolution 93-149). First Quarter FY 93-94 program activities culminated in City Council, on November 2, 1993, taking another step further in providing a narrowly tailored M/WBE program, effective January 1, 1994. This revised program policy adoption provided point/price preference percentages, varying from 2%, 4%, 5%, to 7%. The adoption of this ordinance represented a remedy to the disparity utilization identified in the 1992 M/WBE Utilization Study.

For comparison of 1993-94 and 1992-93 Third Quarters and Year End utilizations and goal achievements, the tables presented on the following page provide dollar expenditures levels and participation percentages. Program goal attainment levels were not achieved in this quarter and decreased participation was experienced in all categories of expenditures, with exception of the minimal increases occurring in the "Minority Male" category for FY93-94 Third Quarter, and "Minority Female" category for FY93-94 Third Quarter and Year End utilizations. Staff is looking into avenues for increased participation, particularly in the lower dollar level expenditures with minority female businesses (refer to section "Operating Budget" of this report for discussion of alternative approaches to increasing the utilization of minority female entrepreneurs).

The Office of Minority, Women and Small Business is responsible for certifying M/WBE businesses and monitoring their utilization by the City. Reports are presented on a quarterly basis to provide the Council with information about program activities and progress towards meeting the established utilization goals.

PROGRAM ACTIVITIES SUMMARY

The Office of Minority, Women and Small Business (OMWSB) staff are engaged in efforts to increase City M/WBE utilization on an ongoing basis. In addition to maintaining the vendor certification process and financial monitoring systems, staff is involved in advertising and outreach activities, vendor assistance, and research and analysis related to the M/WBE program. Activities for the Third Quarter of FY 93-94 include:

M/WBE JOINT CERTIFICATION

M/WBE Status Certification is a required component in any viable M/WBE effort to ensure the integrity of the program. Our program requires certification of all M/WBE's participating on City projects.

Through Third Quarter FY93-94, OMWSB directly assisted almost 1400 individuals/companies with information on the City's M/WBE certification application and program. Of these, five hundred sixty-three (563), or approximately 40%, responded with returning a completed M/WBE application--including required documentation. Two hundred eighty-one firms were certified for the first time, and seventy firms were re-certified, eligible as Minority or Women businesses based on US. Code of Federal Regulations guidelines. Twenty firms were denied eligibility during this period. Approximately 150 firms are held in a pending status for review or further detail or additional information on their firms for processing.

ON-GOING DEPARTMENTAL M/WBE ASSISTANCE

OMWSB has met with ICS department staff, testing the on-line computer program, identifying minority and women businesses by commodity and service categories. This program is now available to City Staff. The program allows City staff, with access to Local Government Financial System (LGFS), to access this new program and locate minority/women businesses--given specific parameters--including location, small business status based on Federal guidelines, M/WBE preference eligibility, ethnic and gender status.

Staff has also met with city departmental representatives designated as Departmental M/WBE Compliance Coordinators to develop strategies and programs to increase M/WBE participation in each of the City Departments. Informational training sessions with Department Coordinators address progress status reports on M/WBE utilization and M/WBE staff roles. Sessions covered importance of vendor certification, methods for improving M/WBE utilization in their respective departments, and an update of Council adopted policies and procedures. Staff intends to continue these workshops on a quarterly basis, as well as on an on-request and as-needed bases.

A re-vamping of tracking expenditures in the individual commodities/services categories, in compliance with the M/WBE Program, requires a focus during this transitional reporting period. Another perspective requiring development is tracking of M/WBE expenditures with subcontractors or sub-vendors. M/WBE staff has set the stage with departmental coordinators for addressing these tracking and reporting purposes.

OUTREACH ACTIVITIES

In order to inform Sacramento minority and women vendors about the city's certification program, OMWSB certification request forms are located at various city locations including the Asian, Black, and Hispanic Chambers of Commerce, Women Construction Owners and Entrepreneurs district office, Revenue Division at City Hall, Department of Public Works, Facility Management, Purchasing Division, and OMWBE, all at the Corporation Yard. Staff has been involved with the various Chambers, making request forms more accessible and providing beneficial program information directly to potential MWBE's, thereby encouraging M/WBE vendors to apply for certification with the City.


Informative public forums were conducted with all JCP Agencies participating. Forums were structured to target the commodity and services business clientele, ie construction, materials and supplies, professional and non-professional services.

The M/WBE Directory was reprinted in early March available in April 1994. Through the JCP all participating agencies collaborated on the printing and reproduction, bringing the cost per directory at a significantly reduced price. Copies are available in all City Libraries Reference Sections. The business community has requested a separate listing of construction, architectural, and engineering services, for which staff has received significantly high request for M/WBE's in these categories. Plans are to issue next scheduled printing, under separate covers.

MAYOR'S TASK FORCE

Current membership roster of the Mayor's Special M/WBE Task Force is attached as "Exhibit B." The Mayor's Task Force conducts its monthly meetings on the third Mondays of each month. Location and time have varied but notification and information may be obtained from City OMWSB staff. The first quarter of this fiscal year resulted in the Task Force developing proposed changes to the Task Force, establishing goals and objectives, defining powers and duties, and establishing coordination with other M/WBE entities. (The developed "Concept Overview" was approved by the Task Force on February 15, 1994. See Attachment "C".) Recommendations for re-constituting the Task Force as an Advisory Commission, with a defined mission and authority has been worked on for Council presentation and approval.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION

THIRD QUARTER M/WBE UTILIZATION STATISTICS FOR FY 1993-94

OPERATING BUDGET

Through the Third quarter of Fiscal Year 1993-94, the City has spent a total of \$19,405,783 from the Operating Budget in "Baseline" (discretionary) purchases for goods and services (See Table 1 and Table 1A). Of this total, the amount spent with M/WBE firms totaled \$2,010,245. This represents 10.4% of the total Baseline City purchases from the Operating Budget for the start of this fiscal year. In comparison to FY92-93 Third Quarter, this also represents an increase of 1.2% (FY92-93 Third Quarter participation was 9.2%). Of the total operating budget, Non-Minority Female firms edged out Minority Male firms in highest utilization of all M/WBE categories. Non-Minority Female firms utilized represented 4.9%, or \$956,350, of total expenditures, and 47.6% of total M/WBE expenditures. Minority Male firms captured 4.7%, or \$902,453, of total expenditures and 44.9% of M/WBE total.

The lowest utilization M/WBE classification was Minority Female firms at .8% (\$151,441) of total baseline expenditures, and 7.5% of total M/WBE expenditures. Staff has determined avenues for researching how to increase participation of minority female firms to include the following strategies:

- (1) Assessment of largest and most significant demands and purchases in commodities and services.
- (2) Researching availability of minority female firms in the system offering the significant commodities and services.
- (3) Network with ethnic Chamber of Commerce organizations to identify capture minority female firms in the certification process.
- (4) Work with Departmental M/WBE Compliance Coordinators to identify and prioritize their needs and demands, matching available minority female firms as options for increasing utilization.

All four of these items will either be completed by the end of FY93-94 Fourth Quarter, or addressed to set the stage for the incoming fiscal year.

Overall, total minority-owned businesses and female-owned businesses captured 5.4% and 5.7%, respectively, of the City's Operating Budget. Departmental utilization is attached as Exhibit "A", further identifying sources within the Operating Budget contributing to progressive rise in the City overall M/WBE utilization.



CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS (CIP) EXPENDITURES

The CIP Budget expenditures are tracked using the same "baseline" object codes utilized in monitoring the Operating Budget. Total "baseline" CIP expenditures for the Third Quarter FY 1993-94 totaled \$34,936,807. Of that amount, \$1,244,266, or 3.6% was spent with City certified M/WBE firms.

These statistics reflect payments to <u>Prime Contractors</u>. (M/WBE Subcontractors are found in Tables 5 and 5A.) Comparison of Third Quarters of past and current fiscal years in CIP expenditures provide an insignificant decrease of .3%.

Total dollar CIP expenditures increased by 21% from FY92-93 at \$28,879,800 to \$34,936,807 in FY93-94. Total M/WBE expenditures correspondingly increased in dollar levels from FY92-93 \$1,133,699 to \$1,244,266 in FY93-94, representing a 9.7% increase in expenditure level. The higher the dollar level yielded a slightly lower Total M/WBE percentage from 3.9% in FY92-93 to 3.6% in FY93-94, comparison Third Quarters.





OTHER EXPENDITURE INFORMATION

Some expenditures with M/WBE firms are also tracked through an exception report of M/WBE firms utilized, but not reported for departments. An additional \$269,112 in expenditures were tracked in the vendor codes not identified as M/WBE, but were in fact certified M/WBE firms.

FY92-93 Third Quarter expenditures was reported at \$508,486, as "Other Expenditures." The reported FY93-94 Third Quarter level represents a significantly reduced level, indicating a higher level of appropriate reporting expenditures on the part of the Departmental staff. In other words, the Departments efforts are providing an audit trail of exact expenditures for reporting purposes.




AGGREGATE CITY M/WBE EXPENDITURES

The Operating Expenditures and CIP Expenditures are combined here with the "Other Expenditures" for the Third Quarter FY 1993-94, as provided in Table 4 below. The aggregate expenditures total for the quarter is \$54,342,590. Participation by M/WBE firms reached \$3,523,623, which represents approximately 6.5% of the total aggregate expenditures. Although this is somewhat less the year end FY92-93 (at 8.0%), it does represent a only a slight decrease from 7.2% in the Third Quarter of FY92-93, in fiscal quarter comparisons.

SUBCONTRACTOR UTILIZATION

Subcontractor Utilization On Construction Contracts

Statistical records on M/WBE subcontractor utilization are collected by Public Works Facility Management Division, Public Works Engineering Division and Utilities Department. Information was compiled from project files of formal bid contracts with a value of \$25,000 or more. The value of construction contracts during FY 93-94 Third Quarter totals \$8,966,283. M/WBE Subcontracts participation amounted to \$2,447,771, representing a utilization rate of 27.3% by Prime Contractors.

Prime Contractor expenditures, reported in "Table 2: CIP Expenditure Totals," represent actual payments within the fiscal reporting period. The reported subcontractor amounts are total subcontract awards on bid selected projects.


Tables 5 and 5A provide M/WBE Subcontractors utilization awards, reported by Public Works Engineering, Public Works Facilities Management, and Utilities Department. In comparison of third quarters, the reported total M/WBE Subcontractor utilization rate of 27.3% represents a 22.4% increase from Third Quarter FY 92-93 at 4.9%, and is almost three times over the 9.6% level reported FY 92-93 End of Year. The obvious increase is attributed to various factors of tracking, policy direction, program development, departmental staff focus and commitment.


Subcontractor utilization by ethnicity and gender is provided in the following table for the total funds of \$2,447,771 awarded to M/WBE subcontractors. Reported statistics resulted in thirty-five Non-minority Female-owned firms being awarded \$970,073, representing 39.6% of all subcontractor grants. The second highest amount reported was awarded to twenty-two Hispanic male-owned firms at a subcontractor participation rate of 24.8%, for a total of \$605,922 of all subcontractor grants. Next highest utilization is reported for Native American/Aleut Alaskan Native male at 17.5% for spending level of \$428,700 for three firms. Twelve Asian/Pacific Islander male-owned firms, receiving \$286,368, represented a utilization rate of 11.7%. One Hispanic female-owned firm received \$98,044 for a 4% participation level. Participation level of 1.8% by three Native American female firms received \$44,209. One African American female-owned firm received \$768 for a rate of .03% of total M/WBE subcontracting funds. Of the nine ethnic/gender categories tracked, seventy-eight firms were reported in eight ethnic/gender categories. No utilization was reported for Asian/Pacific Island female-owned firms.

Table 5A provides a visual comparison of reported utilization of M/WBE subcontracts by ethnicity and gender for FY 1993-94 Third Quarter:

Non-utilization or low subcontracting participation, categories, in comparison fiscal periods (FY 92-93 Third Quarter, FY 92-93 End of Year, FY93-94 Third Quarter) remained a somewhat consistent in the low utilization for African American Female-owned businesses and non-utilization of Asian/Pacific Islander Female businesses. Non-participation, or low level utilization, may be cause to spend focused efforts in identifying resource availability, determining outreach capability, and developing structured tracking and reporting formats.

POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

This report is presented to keep the Council apprised of progress toward meeting the established goals of minority and woman business enterprise participation in discretionary City business transactions. No policy or new policies are recommended at this time.

SUMMARY

This report recommends Council adopt staff's proposal to form a permanent M/WBE Advisory Committee to the Mayor/Council, whose goal is to provide to the

Mayor/Council an on-going resource of local business and community leaders who are well versed in the M/WBE field. This Committee will replace the existing Mayor's Special M/WBE Task Force.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In August of 1988 City Council Resolution 88-743 established the formation of the Mayor's Special M/WBE Task Force. This temporary body, consisting of 13 representatives from a cross section of people and interests within the City of Sacramento, met with the City Manager or his designee on a quarterly basis to provide input on the City's M/WBE Program. The Task Force was designed as an ad-hoc group that would ultimately be disbanded.

Over the past five years the Task Force has attempted to provide timely and useful advice to the Mayor through the auspices of the Office of Minority, Women & Small Business (OMWSB). The Task Force has continued to evolve. Recently the Task Force modified its organization by electing officers and operating independently of OMWSB.

As M/WBE issues came more to the forefront of the Mayor/Council and the community, the Mayor desired to have the Task Force meet more often to confront the issues at hand, and in March 1993 the City Council approved the request to have the Task Force meet every month. This change, coupled with the expiration of terms of several Task Force members and the requirement to meet on a monthly basis made it more difficult to reach a consensus regarding the issues at hand.

DISCUSSION

Staff feels that the proposed re-formation (see Attachment I) will be beneficial to all parties. For the Mayor/Council, the M/WBE Advisory Committee (hereafter Advisory Committee) will provide a greater level of expertise and knowledge in the area of M/WBE issues and thereby enhance the quality of information and recommendations currently provided to the Mayor/Council.

The proposed Advisory Committee will add several members from local Chambers and other groups currently not represented by the Task Force. The community will be better served in that Advisory Committee members will better reflect the current diversity of Sacramento. As a permanent body, it will provide on-going assistance to the Council and community.

As the important and timely issues and concerns of the M/WBE community become more visible and the desire for further empowerment increases, it is critical that an effective

and action oriented body be present to promote these City objectives. The proposed M/WBE Advisory Committee will be able to go beyond the scope of the Task Force. It will meet the objectives cited and be a more effective asset to the Mayor/Council and to the community.

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

Implementation of the M/WBE Advisory Committee will entail a nominal financial impact. Committee members receive no compensation. They meet in City facilities. Incidental mailing costs are covered by OMWSB, which also pays for staff assistance provided by that Office (attendance at monthly Committee meetings).

POLICY CONSIDERATIONS

The proposed re-formation of the Task Force into the Advisory Committee will further enhance the Council's stated position of increased participation of the M/WBE community within the City of Sacramento.

M/WBE

As stated earlier, staff believes the M/WBE Advisory Committee will have a most positive impact by 1) providing the Mayor/Council with permanent expert and current advice on local M/WBE issues and concerns and 2) acting as a conduit for communication between the Mayor/Council and concerned community groups, businesses and individuals.
