Description/Analysis

Issue: Staff has developed a proposed ordinance to require cooling in existing and future residential hotels in the City of Sacramento with six or more rooms. The proposed ordinance also requires notice of public cooling centers to be posted in residential hotels and delivered to occupied rooms during the months of June through September, and while cooling centers remain open. The purpose is to improve the living conditions and protect the health and safety of low-income, elderly, and mentally and physically disabled members of the Sacramento community.



Rationale for Recommendation: Residential hotels serve as the permanent home for approximately 750 members of the Sacramento community. Residential hotel tenants who do not have the benefit of air-conditioning will receive notice of the location of public cooling centers.



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Background

The City of Sacramento was recently gripped by a summer heat wave in which temperatures reached 111 degrees and exceeded triple digits for 11 days in a row. Tragically, there were approximately 100 heat-related deaths statewide in July 2006. Three deaths which may be determined to be heat related occurred in residential hotels in the City of Sacramento during the month of July 2006.

The Sacramento Valley reaches daytime high temperatures which average over 90 degrees in the months of July and August. The City of Sacramento experiences temperatures over 90 degrees Fahrenheit an average of 74 days per year. In contrast the cities of Long Beach, Los Angeles, San Jose and San Diego experience temperatures over 90 degrees Fahrenheit an average of only 22, 22, 3 and 2 days per year, respectively. The Federal Emergency Management Agency recommends that during periods of extreme heat, persons should spend at least two hours per day in an air-conditioned place to avoid risk of heat exhaustion, heat stroke, and other heat related illness.

Initial Response

Following the initial report of deaths on July 25th, the City's Fire and Police Departments visited all of the downtown residential hotels. Fire and Police staff performed welfare checks, distributed general heat warning information, and made referrals to the ten air-conditioned community "cooling centers" operated by the Parks and Recreation Department. On July 26th, the Fire and Police Department extended their outreach to mobile home parks, apartments, and other high risk residential non-air conditioning locations. Over 700 housing units were ultimately checked during this period by approximately 250 staff.

The City also deployed its reverse 9-1-1 system for the first time to contact those who may be at risk to notify them of "cooling centers" located throughout the City of Sacramento where they could get relief from the hot weather. In all, nine sessions were launched including three in Spanish. A total of 16,369 calls were completed. Media advisories, updates to the city's website, and interviews were also provided to increase awareness of the City's cooling centers and offer suggestions on staying cool.

In light of the tragic deaths, the City placed an immediately priority on developing solutions to mitigate risk to members of the community that occupy residential hotels without air conditioning. Residential hotels provide permanent housing for very low-income and elderly persons. Approximately 50% of the hotel residents have been diagnosed with a mental or physical disability.

The proposed ordinance (see Attachment 2) was developed collaboratively by the City's Neighborhood Services, Code Enforcement, City Attorney's Office, Police and Fire Departments, and contains both immediate and long-term provisions.

Provisions of the Proposed Ordinance that Apply Immediately

The proposed ordinance will require residential hotels to post a notice of the location of public cooling centers provided by the City of Sacramento. The notice must be posted in a conspicuous location at the front desk, lobby or primary public entrance way at all times during the months of June through September and while cooling centers remain open. The proposed ordinance will also require notice to be delivered to every residential hotel unit in use. The attached July 25, 2006 News Release provides a current listing of public cooling centers (see Attachment 3).

Long-Term Provisions of the Proposed Ordinance

The proposed ordinance requires every residential hotel (any building containing six or more residential units) to provide a "cooled room" of not less than 20 square feet per hotel tenant by June 1, 2007. The 20 square foot requirement will allow for deployment of sleeping cots if necessary for all residents. The cooled room must be capable of maintaining a temperature of 80 degrees Fahrenheit at a point three feet above the floor at all times during the months of June through September.

There are 10 residential hotels operating in the central City of Sacramento, housing approximately 750 residents. The following five residential hotels do not currently provide air-conditioned units:

Funding

Staff is exploring funding alternatives with the Sacramento Municipal Utilities District (SMUD) and Sacramento Housing and Redevelopment Agency (SHRA) to assist owners of residential hotels that would be impacted by adoption of the proposed ordinance.

Outreach with Stakeholders

City staff held meetings to discuss the proposed ordinance with owners of the residential hotels that do not currently provide air-conditioned units.

AMENDING CHAPTER 8.100 OF TITLE 8 OF THE SACRAMENTO CITY CODE TO REQUIRE COOLING AND NOTICE OF COOLING CENTERS IN RESIDENTIAL HOTELS

BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SACRAMENTO:

SECTION 1. Purpose and Scope.

This ordinance applies to all existing and future residential hotels in the City of Sacramento with 6 or more rooms. Its purpose is to improve the living conditions and protect the health and safety of residential hotel residents, including low-income, elderly, and mentally and physically disabled members of the Sacramento community.

SECTION 2. Findings.

The Sacramento City Council hereby finds and declares that:

- A. There are 10 residential hotels operating in the central city of Sacramento, housing approximately 750 residents.
 - B. Residential hotels provide permanent housing for very low-income persons. Many of these residents pay 42-50% of their monthly incomes toward rent.
 - C. Approximately 50% of the hotel residents have been diagnosed with a mental or physical disability. The primary means of transportation for these residents is bus, light rail, or walking.
 - D. Many residential hotel rooms do not contain kitchen or bathroom facilities.
 - E. Sacramento Valley daytime high temperatures average over 90 degrees F during the months of July and August. The City of Sacramento experiences temperatures over 90 degrees F an average of 74 days per year. In contrast, the cities of Long Beach, Los Angeles, San Jose and San Diego experience temperatures over 90 degrees F an average of only 22, 22, 3, and 2 days per year, respectively.
 - F. In June, 2006, the City of Sacramento experienced eight days of temperatures exceeding 100 degrees F. In July, 2006, it suffered from eleven consecutive days of temperatures exceeding 100 degrees F.
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- G. The Federal Emergency Management Agency recommends that during periods of extreme heat, persons should spend at least two hours per day in an air-conditioned place to avoid the risk of heat exhaustion, heat stroke, and other heat related illnesses.
- H. There is no requirement that residential hotels within the City of Sacramento provide cooling facilities or cooled rooms for their tenants. Currently, approximately one-half of the residential hotels do not provide any such facilities or rooms.
- I. Three deaths occurred in residential hotels in the City of Sacramento during the July, 2006, heat-wave.

SECTION 3. Section 8.100.492 is added to the Sacramento City Code to read as follows:

Section 8.100.492 DEFINITIONS.

For purposes of sections 8.100.494 and 8.100.496, the following definitions shall apply:

- A. "Cooling Facilities" means equipment, appliances, devices, or systems capable of cooling every Residential Hotel Unit at a maintained unit temperature of eighty (80) degrees Fahrenheit or less at a point three feet above the floor.
- B. "Cooled Room" means a space or spaces provided by the Residential Hotel owner or operator within the Residential Hotel of not less than 20 square feet per Residential Hotel tenant, open to all Residential Hotel tenants 24 hours per day from June 1st through September 30th of every year with a maintained temperature of no higher than eighty (80) degrees Fahrenheit at a point three feet above the floor.
- C. "Public Cooling Centers" are locations that are open to the public and which are designated for the purpose of providing relief from the heat.
- D. "Notice of Opening of Public Cooling Centers" means the notice(s) given by the City Manager or his/her designee to Residential Hotel owners or operators that Public Cooling Centers are open, of their locations, the expected dates they will remain open, and their hours of operation.
- E. "Residential Hotel" means any building containing six or more rooms intended or designed to be used, or which are used, rented, or hired out, to be occupied, or which are occupied, for sleeping purposes by tenants, which is or may be the primary residence of such tenants, provided that a majority of these rooms are Residential Hotel Units.
- F. "Residential Hotel Unit" means a room in a Residential Hotel intended or designed to be used, or which is used, rented, or hired out, to be occupied, or which is occupied, for sleeping purposes by a tenant, and which lacks either or both a self-contained kitchen or bathroom.

SECTION 4. Section 8.100.494 is added to the Sacramento City Code to read as follows:

Section 8.100.494 COOLING.

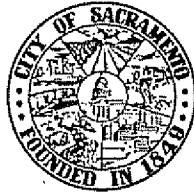
Not later than June 1, 2007, Residential Hotel owners or operators shall provide either a Cooled Room or Cooling Facilities as defined in section 8.100.492. The Cooled Room and Air Cooling Facilities shall be provided, installed and maintained in a safe and operable condition and in accordance with the Uniform Building Code, the Uniform Mechanical Code, Title 15 of this Code, and all other applicable laws.

SECTION 5. Section 8.100.496 is added to the Sacramento City Code to read as follows:

Section 8.100.496 NOTICE OF OPENING OF PUBLIC COOLING CENTERS.

Every Notice of Opening of Public Cooling Centers shall be posted in a conspicuous location at the front desk in the lobby of the Residential Hotel or, if there is no lobby, in the Residential Hotel's primary public entrance way at all times from June 1st through September 30th of every year and while Public Cooling Centers remain open and shall be delivered to every Residential Hotel Unit in use upon the Residential Hotel owner or operator's receipt of the Notice of Opening of Public Cooling Centers.

Sacramento Residents can Access Air Conditioned Community Centers and Area Pools to get Relief from the Heat

Sacramento, California, July 25, 2006—The City of Sacramento Department of Parks and Recreation encourages residents to visit their local Community Centers and Area Pools to get relief from the hot weather.

There are ten (10) air-conditioned Community Centers located throughout the City of Sacramento. The general hours-of-operation for these facilities is 8am to 8pm.

The City of Sacramento Department of Parks and Recreation also operates fifteen (15) pools. During the summer months, the pools are generally open from 1p.m. to 5p.m. In 2002, the Department of Parks and Recreation instituted the "Cool in the Pool" program. The program extends pool hours-of-operation on days when the outside temperature climbs above 101 degrees Fahrenheit. On such days, the City's pools open from 1p.m. to 7p.m.
