SUBJECT: Camp Sacramento Revenue Proposal

SUMMARY

This report discusses alternative revenue policies for Camp Sacramento and recommends an incremental revenue program which will eventually result in an enterprise operation.

BACKGROUND

Historically, Camp Sacramento operations have been part of the City's General Fund since 1919. All fees and charges generated by Camp Sacramento operations have been treated as a revenue and returned to the General Fund.

In recent years it has been the Department's policy to recommend fees and charges to cover all direct expenses of Camp Sacramento operations, exclusive of employee fringe benefits, capital improvements, major equipment purchases and indirect City costs such as overhead and insurance.

The staff has identified three alternatives for the City Council to consider in the development of a revenue policy for Camp Sacramento during the 1930 session. They are as follows:

Alternate #1 - Existing Policy

The revenue structure covers all of the direct costs for the operation of Camp Sacramento including salaries, food stuffs, energy, and materials and supplies.

Alternate #2 - Operational Enterprise Policy

The fee structure is designed to cover all of the costs identified in Alternate #1 and additionally, employee fringe benefits, major equipment purchases, and the salary and fringe benefit of departmental support personnel.

Alternate #3 - Full Enterprise Policy

The fee structure is designed to cover all of the expenditures identified in Alternates 1 and 2 and, in addition, make a contribution to indirect City costs, insurance related to Camp, and capitalize equipment and improvements.

FEE POLICY ANALYSIS

The Camp Sacramento season is projected for 18 weeks for 1980. This includes 13 weeks of programming, with full staffs available, and five weeks of skeleton crews for the opening and closing of the mountain facility. Exhibit A provides graphic illustration of the program calendar.

The project expenditures for the 1980 season eliminate Alternate #1 as a consideration. Basically, the current rates will not provide sufficient revenue to continue the existing policy. Additionally, the City staff has been directed by the City Council to explore alternatives which would eliminate Camp Sacramento as a general fund obligation.

Alternate #2 is described as an operational enterprise. This means the fee structure for Camp Sacramento services is equal to all of the expenses for the Camp operation, with the exception of insurance, City overhead and capitalization of equipment and improvements. The estimated expenditures for the 18 week program under this alternative is \$196,500. Alternate #3 is described as a Full Enterprise operation. The additional expenses to cover insurance, overhead and capitalization is estimated at \$26,500. This results in a total expenditure for Alternate #3 estimated at \$228,000.

The staff has developed a fee proposal for Camp Sacramento designed to cover the expenses for Alternate #2 and #3. The fee increases represented by Alternate #2-Operational Enterprise, represent a 20% increase over the current rates. The fee increases represented by Alternate #3-Full Enterprise, represent a 39% increase over the current rates. A comparative rate schedule is provided as follows:

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council adopt Alternate #2-Operational Enterprise, as an incremental fee escalation policy for Camp Sacramento effective March 15, 1980. Support of this alternative will provide the City with an opportunity to review the impact of substantial fee increases prior to the adoption of a Full Enterprise policy for Camp Sacramento.

The fee schedule to support a Full Enterprise operation requires a 39% increase over current rates which could result in an unmarketable service. Historically, substantial rate increases at City operated leisure service facilities have resulted in as much as a 15% reduction in participation. The staff has no way of forecasting the results of a 39% increase, but assumes that the reduction in the participation would be in excess of 15%. This would effectively negate the intent of the policy to operate Camp Sacramento as a Full Enterprise.
