Candidate Statement:

The Central City is a valuable resource that belongs to all residents of the urban area. Although faced with land use conflicts and social contradictions similar to other cities, it is unlike many in the positive attention and concern expressed by the public and local government for its future viability as a place for work, residence, and a reflection of the historic and cultural roots of the city. The Sacramento Central City Study, for example, has provided a comprehensive fact base and goal outline to assist in evaluating problems and potentials.
